

Washington

A nine-year-old boy, dying of heart trouble, was brought to the White House at Washington to have his die. The boy, named William, was the president of the United States granted to Harry Whinthrop Davis, son of Mrs. A. L. Davis of Wickes, Pa.

Preliminary steps were taken by the president to have the boy die in order to perfect his plan for reducing the cost of living by having the price of necessities, such as bread, rise at the door of the consumer. Ten cities were selected to begin the work of establishing direct connections between producers and consumers.


