Five of the great nations of the world and several of the smaller ones are grappling in the grip of death.

Prayers are entreated but others are drawn into the furnace of war.

Death and destruction walk abroad now, and famine and pestilence will follow.

Wars of the past will beat the names of children when compared with the present struggle.

Men will go down like blades of grass before the modern engines of destruction, and a once fair land will be peopled with widows and orphans and the upland from the field of carnage.

If the great bankers of the world unite and close their vaults to the kings and emperors whose personal passions have plunged their patriotic citizens into the deadliest struggle of the age, this war will soon end.

Nations cannot fight and feed armies without money, and when money fails away rational sense returns.

The banks of the United States have wisely set the example. Their vaults have been closed.

If the money barons of Europe will follow their example we will have peace.

It is time for action.

adapt itself to the growing intelligence of the times it would not exist at all.

When I meet a highly intelligent Catholic priest, as I occasionally do, I never have any quarrel with him. We meet on a basis of good-fellowship, and we meet as equals.

The late Father Dorey of Chicago was one of my dear, personal friends. I used to take great satisfaction in his company. I met him first at the Chicago bankers' banquet, and afterward at his home on several occasions.

Father Dorey knew history, literature, economics, and he knew how to manage men. Father Dorey succeeded to me: "The rule of reason comes into Rome just as fast as the human race evolves. Every great spiritual dogma is a spiritual truth, and therefore is elastic. Only the ignorant insist on putting a literal translation in figures of speech. When we have more imagination, more spirituality, more humility, we will have a different religion and a better religion."

Father Dorey issued an order that there should be no excommunication within a mile of his church, and his wishes were respected. And his church was in the stockyards in Chicago, a locality that enjoys the reputation of being the home of the "rough necks."

Father Dorey was a humanitarian. He regarded the Catholic church as a great polytechnic, and he did what he honestly could to uplift people and bless the human race. And he had some very troublesome problems to solve.

Father Schmidt in New York, who was a girl up into baldness and was a typical Roman Catholic priest, was a typical Roman Catholic priest, more than Robinson, who was elected for poisoning an innocent young woman, was a typical Baptist clergyman.

For Presbyterians I have a great respect, but for the Westminster catechism I have no respect.

It is a barbaric relic of savage superstition, gotten originally from the Catholics.

As far as I can see, all the good people who are prejudiced (and I know many good people who are prejudiced) would be better people without their theology.

Work, study, laughter, love, do not require any superstitious faith in a creature that made the world and then afterward got mad and damned it, because it had not turned out to his approval, and who then insisted that his only son should die before he could forgive some of the people who had failed to salute his flag.

All formal religions are made up of two ingredients: theology and morality.

Theology deals with a Theos or God. Morality deals with man's relations to his fellow men. Moral conduct is right conduct.

Immoral conduct is bad conduct, or the actions that bring bad results.

Morality and superstition never mix. At best they are only a metaphysical mixture, not a chemical compound.

If all formal religions in America were wiped out completely, there would be just as beautiful, kind, courteous and good will would bring the same good results, and faithful labor applied to land would make the waste places green and the desert to blossom like the rose. Tolstoy said, "There with the infamy!" And what he referred to was theological superstition.

Ingersoll well said, "The force of pity have put out the fires of hell."

Ingersoll did not make any fine distinctions between the Roman Catholic faith and that of the Protestants. To him both were bad, and it seems to me that Ingersoll was on solid footing.

That good Reporter today does not trouble himself about heaven and hell; and he is not afraid of either Catholics or Protestants.

Let Rome howl! Also, let the Meccas howl! If it comes to a show-down I would just as soon trust my fate in the hands of Archbishop Ireland of Minnesota as in the unsanitized clutches of the editor of The Menace of Missouri.

In The Menace I do not find anything that is sweet, wholesome, beneficial, peaceful or uplifting.

There is not a laugh in it from one year's end to the other. It is a disseminator of strife—a disseminator of fear—a lower of blood. And while I have no love for the Roman Catholic faith, yet on the other hand I have noticed that the Catholics who are on my payroll are quite as decent, quite as honest, quite as efficient as the Protestants.

Let it be said to the credit of Catholicism that it has nothing to do with Italy—Italy! The theologians, the pamphleteers who are trying to force on innocent children, impressionable women, and unthinking, wooly-headed men theological platitudes, get no support from Rome.

Billy Sunday's endeavor to dilute common sense and make of mankind a hysterical, bigoted, awestruck mob, is just as big a menace to everything that the Knights of Columbus have stored in their cellars, and fully as bad as anything on this in the religiousness of cathedrals.

Hitting the sawdust trail, as so much

per, in an endeavor to galvanize Protestantism into life, is fully as foul as the old idea of selling indulgences.

The Menace gets its constituency largely from Billy Sundayites, the fearful, hysterical, impressionable people who abandon their brains in order to clutch some personal good without paying for it. These people are not latent, awaiting good. They want only to get it. And yet, stripped of their superstition, they are pretty good Catholics, just the same. The success of The Menace is possible only in a society where one fear is replaced by another. The Catholics (far left, the Billy-Sundayites fear both Catholics and the devil.

Blessed is that man who does not bellyache.

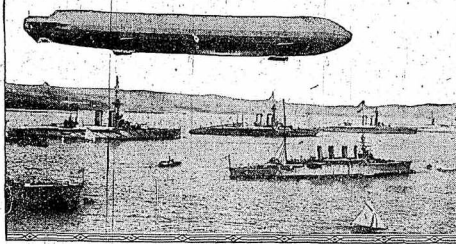

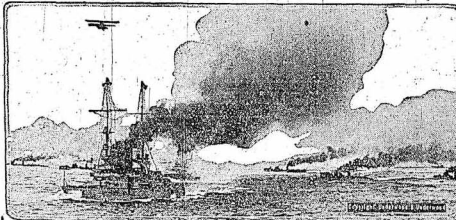

GERMANY'S POWERFUL TORPEDO BOAT FLOTILLA



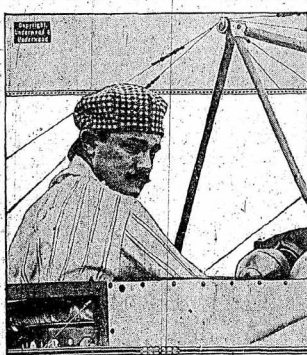

INTERESTING BITS OF NEWS FROM THE GREAT GERMAN EMPIRE.

WHAT'S DOING IN OLD HOME

Summary of the Most Important Happenings in the Land of the Kaiser—Timely Items for the German Readers.

Victor Kerecsius, director of the wagon factory at Hildesheim, Hungary, took a walk in his garden and noticed that the cover had been removed from the ten-foot dung cart. Looking down, he saw his seven-year-old son, lying unconscious at the bottom. He immediately took a ladder and descended to take up the girl, but as he was overcome by the poisonous gas, fell down and did not stir any more. A number of persons arrived by means of hooks they pulled out the two men and the girl. A doctor was then promptly to work on the unconscious persons, but only the young man returned to life.

Doctor Lorenz, formerly a Catholic priest at Kallershausen, did not long ago at Wiesbaden. He had to retire as a priest, although he was well liked by his parishioners, because the clergy found him to be too tolerant toward other denominations. Then he became editor of a Catholic paper in Wiesbaden. After his death the German government asked his surviving sisters to return the Order of the Red Eagle of the fourth class, a decoration which was said to have been awarded him in 1888 on account of a fine funeral sermon which he preached on the death of Kaiser Friedrich. But Doctor Lorenz had never received the decoration. Nevertheless it was solemnly announced at the time that it had been conferred on him.

Some women in Stuttgart seem to have turned their cathedrals of prayer into from the English suffragettes. The Schwäbische Zeitung, in a report of a socialist meeting devoted largely to an account of the abuses of soldiers in the army, said that "the extravagance of the leading speakers were accompanied by hysterical cries of 'die from female figures without character.' Shortly afterwards two women who had attended the meeting called at the office of the paper and wished to see the responsible editor. As soon as they faced him they pulled out dog whistles, which they held concealed and gave him a sound whiffing, whereupon they departed.

The Berlin Vorwärts has published the annual report of the executive committee of the Social Democratic party. There are still over one million of registered members, and the "red west" alone brought 157,000 new members. But the paper concludes that the addition from the ranks of the young people has been almost nil. The young people's organizations being suppressed and persecuted everywhere and parties of different kinds having a greater attraction than socialism. Many socialists were severely punished because they were very aggressive during the "red week."

Leipzig and vicinity were visited by an earthquake a few days ago. There were three distinct shocks in the course of two minutes. In many houses the doors flew open, tables and chairs were upset, and the dishes in the kitchens rattled. The seismograph at the university was thrown from its base at the headquarters, so that it did not register the movements in satisfactory manner. The earthquake was local, being noticed only as far south as Preussburg, Saxony, and Dessau, Anhalt. Absolutely no damage was done.

At the drill grounds of Friedrichsfeld, near Düsseldorf, a corpse was noticed hanging around on a wooden log and attracting attention by trying to get to places where the public has nothing to do. Finally he was arrested. Then it turned out that his artificial limb was hollow and contained important military papers and incriminating evidence. The spy refused to give an account of himself, but he was curiously in the service of the French government.

Captain Heiser, formerly a captain in the navy, has been connected with the airship navy at Friedrichshafen for seven years, and during that time he has made 700 trips with Zeppelin air cruises. All of the trips were successful, and their combined length was 55,000 miles, or considerably more than twice the distance around the earth at the equator.

It was stated some time ago that Herr Willem, a millenarist at Bielefeld, had bought the Grossschlocher mountain peak in the Black Forest Alps. He had already paid part of the price when the apartments of Austria started such an outcry against the mountain being shut off from the public that he found it prudent to give up the deal.

The highly unpopular tax on pleasure resorts, known as the kingdom of Prussia about \$2,500,000 during the year 1913-14, of which amount 50 per cent constituted over \$100,000.

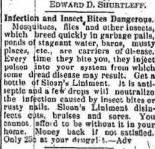
