Next comes the portrayal of the middle French period, where all the arts are modern with age, and the drama and ballets have a native color compelling of the heart.

The third part of the program has to do with American songs from 1850 to 1900, which epitomize with the heart history of our own people and breathe the spirit and joy, the humor and the melody of intrinsic Americans.
