U.S.—Teutonic War News

Germany's threat of a great offing against the British Isles, and its implication of an Invasion of America or of Impresses American military men. In its weekly review the war department said that the German threat, even in spite of his vast preparations, will not take the offensive unless forced into it.

After a terrible winter preparation among the British Isles, the No Man's Land on the extreme right of the American sector north of Touquet, April 10, was captured. The Germans were quickly dislodged and only a comparative small effort was made to hold.

One of the American patrols, ordered to reconnoiter the area of No Man's Land in the Teutonic sector, The Germans fled, carrying with them several bodies of men killed or wounded.
