Only 84 days in the Year in Which the World's Business Is Not Interrupted Somewhere by Holidays and Sundays.

CURIOUS FACTS ABOUT THE WORLD'S HOLIDAYS.

There is no national legal holiday in the United States. Massachusetts alone observes New Year's Day as a legal holiday. Five countries do not observe Christmas as a legal holiday. New Year's Day is the only holiday observed throughout the world. Eleven different dates are observed as New Year's Day in different parts of the world. International business will be interfered with by holidays. Sundays in 281 days in 1936, in different parts of the world. This leaves only 156 days in which universal banking business is possible. November, with 28 holidays in different parts of the world, leads the month. March, with 16, has the fewest holidays. It leads the nations of the world with 84 holidays. The United States comes next with 70.
