WHICH of the above two lines is easier to read?

The second, because each number stands out by itself clearly and distinctly.

If, when calling a telephone number you run the digits of the number together, it is difficult for the operator to understand you, thus the possibility of your getting a wrong number is increased.

Always separate the digits of the number and enunciate clearly.

Telephone operators are required to repeat numbers as follows:

"1" to be spoken as "OH"—with a long O.

"2" to be spoken as "WUN"—with a strong N.

"3" to be spoken as "TH-R-EE"—with a strong T and long O's.

"4" to be spoken as "FO-ER"—with a long O.

"5" to be spoken as "FIVE"—with a long V and strong V.

"6" to be spoken as "SIX"—with a strong X.

"7" to be spoken as "SEVEN"—two syllables.

"8" to be spoken as "ATE"—with a long A and a strong T.

"9" to be spoken as "NIEN"—long syllable with strong N and end.

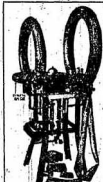

Twelve Tire Tests No. 9

This series of twelve tests is designed to tell the operator the best of the tube-fit.

Tube-Fit

This photographic reproduction teaches an important lesson.

The tube shown was made by cementing together sections of two tubes of the same standard size—once a Michelin, the other a standard tube made in the ordinary way. This composite tube, slightly inflated, was then laid in a casting cut in half longitudinally.

Now that the Michelin tube fits the casing perfectly (because Michelin tubes are made from shaped wires), the casing where the other tube naturally wrinkles, this tube is really pinched in fitting, even then in place, or break where caused or placed under the pressure of inflation and use.

In selecting tubes, therefore, it is important for you to know whether the tube is naturally straight or naturally ring-shaped. You can determine this by holding the tube up while deflated: straight tubes hang straight, while Michelin tubes, which are ring-shaped, hang in a decided curve.
