Fismes, Germany's Great Storehouse, Captured by French-U.S. Troops.

BIG VICTORY FOR YANKEES

Captured 6,000 Prisoners and Enemy Routed—British Forces to Withdraw Ten-Mile Front Between Montdidier and Moreuil—A Men Help Take Sole.

London, Aug. 5.—The Germans have recrossed to the north bank of the Vesle and the French have effected four crossings of the river. The first information received here: "The Germans are retreating stubbornly and fighting resolutely."

Yanks Help Take Vesle.

Paris, Aug. 5.—The town of Fismes, the Allies' great storehouse on the Aisne-Marne, has been captured by the French and American troops, according to the French official communiqué received here. The French have crossed the Vesle at several points.

General Retreat on Vesle.

With the French Army in France, Aug. 5.—The Germans are retreating to the north bank of the Vesle, between Bourges and Moreuil, northwest of Montdidier, on a front of five miles.

Allied patrols are keeping in contact with the enemy.

NATION SHORT MILLION MEN
