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M'CORMICK WINS

Nominated for United States Senator by Plurality of 40,000.

THOMPSON CARRIES CHICAGO

Mayor's Plurality Estimated at 18,000
—Senator Lewis F. Hunt
Democrat—Is Nominated

Chicago, Sept. 12.—Nellie McCormick has been elected for United States senator by the Republican ticket after a close and somewhat surprising plurality battle that overthrew the Republican power, according to the latest returns.

Mayor William Hall Thompson carried Chicago by approximately 18,000 plurality, as indicated by the returns. But McCormick is claiming up to 100,000 from the dynamic coalition that a plurality that may run from 50,000 to 70,000.

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FOOD VIOLATORS BROUGHT TO JUSTICE

Over 2,000 cases of violations of the United States Food Administration laws have been investigated during the past three months by the Bureau of Investigation and Enforcement operating under the United States Food Administration.

These violators included wholesale and retail grocers, owners of public restaurants, bakers, and milk and ice distributors.

As a result of these charges, \$50,000 has been received from the United States Food Administration for the proper amount of postage, setting 100,000 copies of the United States Food Administration laws.

Many of the violators protested their innocence, but the United States Food Administration has asked this nation of the voluntary meat ration of the pounds per person a month.

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The attention of Telephone subscribers is invited to the following offer of the Postmaster General:

"Order No. 1931, August 28, 1918." "Owing to the necessity for conserving labor and material and to eliminate a cost which is now borne by the telephone companies, the Postmaster General has decided to offer the following rates for service or installation charge will be made on and after September 1, 1918, for all new installations, also a charge for alterations in existing lines."

Installation charges will be as follows: Where the rate is \$2.50 or less—\$1.50. Where the rate is more than \$2.50 but not exceeding \$4.00—\$2.00. Where the rate is more than \$4.00—\$2.50.

The moving charges to the subscriber will be the same as for the installation of a new line, but the cost of the material necessary for making the change.

"In accordance with Bulletin No. 2, issued by the U. S. Post Office, dated August 1, 1918, the telephone and telegraph companies shall continue operation in the ordinary course of business through regular channels, in all cases where no adjustments are pending or immediately necessary, they should be taken up by the company involved through the usual channels of action obtained wherever possible. In all cases, however, where rates are changed, changes should be submitted to me for approval before being placed in effect."
