# BULGARIA: UNCONDITIONALLY: TURKEY CUT OFF

Kino Ferdinand's Pleads Envoys  
Dilemma as to Allies' Terms.

TURKS ARE NEXT TO SUE

Bulgaria gives up railways and permits  
Entente to Pass Through  
Country—Also Surrender  
Control of Danube

London, Oct. 12.—(Avin) The receipt of Christmas from Salonica, stating that Bulgaria's surrender to the allies was unconditional, since both revealed that a peace offer from Turkey in Istanbul.

London, Oct. 12.—The unratified conclusion with Bulgaria by the entente allies is a family military convention and contains no provisions of a political character.

Bulgaria agrees to evacuate all the territory she now occupies in Greece and Thrace, in demolishing all forts immediately, and surrender all means of transport to the allies.

Bulgaria also will surrender her ports and control of navigation on the Danube and transfer to the allies free passages through Bulgaria for the development of military operations.

All Bulgarian arms and ammunition are to be turned over to the control of the allies and transfer is conceded the right to occupy all important strategic points.

A military occupation of Bulgaria will be entrusted to British, French and Italian troops, and the advanced parts of Greece and Serbia respectively to Greek and Serbian troops.

According to a Constantinian source, the armistice is a complete surrender and Bulgaria ceases to be a belligerent.

All questions of territorial rearrangement and the Danube will be primarily settled from the convention.

King Ferdinand's position, being confirmed an internal matter, will be left to him to settle.

The armistice will remain in operation until a final general peace is concluded.

To Move Against Turkey.  
Washington, Oct. 12.—Bulgaria will not be allowed to proceed against Turkey and the allies will support the side of the allies for the remainder of the war.

Paris, Oct. 12.—Bulgaria's surrender unconditionally to the allies and signed an armistice according to the terms of the armistice.
