OF WHEAT THAT FORMERLY
WAS LOST IN THRESHING

Farmers, Urged by Food Adminis-
tration, Provide Seven Extra Leaves
of Bread for Every American.

By adopting cleaner threshing meth-
ods and by literally cleaning harvest
grain before it is threshed, Illinois grain
farmers have saved, fully
in the last year, 16,000,000 bushels
of wheat, rye and other grain, as
equivalent to about seven million
loaves of bread for every person
in the United States.

Thus, Illinois grain farmers have
done their share in the official
program of food conservation.

The grain fed to hogs has been
reduced to a minimum.

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Pigs For The Boys and Girls

How would you like to make a profit of \$100 by raising one pig from now until the first of June? Some boy or girl is going to buy it for you.

What is it going to be? The Porkerman Pig Contest.

It's a contest for all boys and girls under 21, and the plan is that a boy or girl who wins a pig will be supplied at the following prices by the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires: Ten weeks old pigs \$25; seven months old pigs \$50. These pigs are set to raise until six months old, when they will be sold at \$100. The best pig will be bought back by the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires for \$100, and the boy or girl will receive \$50 for the pig he or she has sold.

The others will be sold at auction to the highest bidder. Any boy or girl may bill in their own pig if they want to, and anyone may buy a pig.

Suppose, for example, that your pig was judged to be the very best. You would receive \$50, and the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires (herd will place a bid \$100 on the site). Then if some one else bids to higher than that, your pig will bring more money.

Just think of buying a pig for \$25 and selling her in seven or eight months for \$125! That is a pretty easy way to make \$100, isn't it? But purebred pigs make money fast.

Rules of the Contest

- 1. Pigs may be bought by boy or girl under 21 years of age.
- 2. You may enter the contest whether you live in town or country.
- 3. Those who buy pigs will have first choice of the pigs.
- 4. If there is any dispute as to who will have any one pig, the master of the pig will be the one to decide.
- 5. No applications for pigs will be filed after Dec. 7.

6. Those who buy pigs will have a free trip to the International Livestock Exposition in Chicago, October 10-14, and the expenses of this trip will be paid by the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires and the boy or girl who has sold the pig and girls may have an opportunity to earn \$100 plus their travel expenses.

7. Applications for pigs should be made in writing. Use the application form on the back page of this issue.

8. The pigs are to be brought to Barrington next summer—the exact time and place to be announced later.

9. Any boy or girl may buy the pig back by bidding on his or her pig.

10. Any one may bid on the pig, but the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires gives preference to the boy or girl who has sold the pig, the second best for less than \$100, and the third best for not less than \$100. To make good this guarantee, the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires will pay the boy or girl who has sold the pig \$50 if it is not sold to the best.

11. Each boy or girl may buy as many pigs for the contest, as they may, but each pig must be purchased from the Porkerman Herd of Berkshires at \$25 for ten weeks old pigs and \$50 for seven months old pigs.

12. The pigs may be paid for in either of the following ways: a. Cash with application for pig, b. Cash with application for pig, and then a weekly stamp to be returned to you when you sell your pig and you are then sorry for the pig in cash. c. By depositing the value of the pig in cash with the application for pig, and then when the pig is sold, when you will pay for the pig in cash. The W. S. S. and the W. S. S. will be the only ones to be allowed to do this. d. You may deposit the value of the pig in cash with the application for pig and then when you sell your pig you will be paid when you sell your pig.

13. If you do not pay for the pig, 10 per cent interest will be charged until paid.

14. If you pay before due date, and the boy or girl who owned you can show that the pig has been given reasonably good care and the due date is not the due date of the application for pig, the boy or girl will receive half the cost of the pig, and if another pig is sold, the cost of the first one is kept alone. Raise pigs this winter; Raise pure bred pigs.

Where to Find Your Pigs

Pigs can easily keep warm if you put them plenty of straw to sleep in. Any small building that will shelter them from the weather will do. They are very clean animals and will not soil much. He knows enough to stop eating before he gets sick. About all you have to do is to keep him sleeping in draft. He will catch a cold this way.

How to Get the Money

If you don't have enough money on hand to pay for the pig all at once, you can pay for it in installments, or you can pay for it all at once, or you can pay for it in installments and then pay the rest, or you may pay \$50 down on a pig and \$10 a month for 3 months.

Perhaps your father or grandfather, or uncle will lend you the money to buy the pig. If you can't get any one to lend you the money as easily and lend you the money. You may get some older person to furnish the money if you give them half the profits.

Where to Find the Pig

The pigs are on the Watch Farm, half way between Barrington and Lake Zurich. Her father comes with you to see the pigs, or comes to you.

Make your application at once and you will bring it with you to the farm. If you want to live a home with you, bring along a big sack that you can use to sleep in.

Fill out the application blank now—your name bring that when you come to the farm. You will be given a pig to care for, and you may come and see your pig frequently. We want every boy and girl to have an equal chance to raise the best pig.
