BOYS WORKING IN RESERVE

An industrial unit of the U. S. Boys' Working Reserve, which will be established, will be maintained the agricultural training of all American boys between the ages of sixteen and twenty who are engaged in industry, is the plan of the Farm Unit of the Reserve, which already partly organized after the plan of the Farm Unit of the Reserve. Other plans for 1919 which have been made in its booklet of information issued by the Department of Labor at Washington are as follows:

"To recruit and place American boys in agriculture."

"To afford all these boys training in farm practices before they go to the farms, by means of the Central Farm Training School, to be located in the Farm and Farm-Field Leagues."

"To help raise enough foodstuffs to feed Europe in 1919."

"To maintain the education and welfare of all American boys of high school age."

AMERICANIZE ALL ALIENS

Every man, woman and child in the state of Illinois may be English speaking, no matter the country of birth, but the English language is the language of the State of Illinois, and the mandates of the State Council of Defense for the teaching of English to aliens in the public schools.

The State Council adopted a Council which has been forwarded to Springfield, suggesting that evening classes be made a part of the general method of education of the state. It is as follows:

"Because the Americanization of aliens is greatly advanced when they acquire familiarity with the common language of our country and because this acquisition of language is helpful to every individual in every industry and greatly lessens liability to accidents, it is the opinion of the State Council that the general method of public education throughout the state should by means of evening classes in the public schools and otherwise, provide for encouraging and facilitating

acquisition of the English language by aliens who have come here after passing the age of compulsory attendance."

The State Council at the same time recommended to the state lawmakers the advisability of expanding vocational training in the schools, and in the column of all elementary schools courses designed to teach pupils the habits of cleanliness, temperance and personal hygiene, and to call upon the state to make the public health as an obligation of citizenship.
