

GREAT PEACE PACT WITH GERMANY IS GIVEN IN SUMMARY

Substance of the Treaty Which Was Handed to Delegates at Versailles, Pa.

LEAGUE OF NATIONS FIRST

Alain-Lerroux, Saar Basin, Danzig, Alsace-Lorraine and Other Territory Landed to League of Nations to Minimum—Willits by Be Tied.

Herewith is the official summary of the great peace treaty which was handed to the representatives of the allied nations to the German delegates at Versailles:

The preamble names as parties to the pact the United States, the British empire, France, Italy and the other allied nations, and the League of Nations, which was to be created by the pact. The pact was signed at Versailles, France, on the 28th of June, 1919.

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HIGH SPOTS IN PEACE TREATY

Alsace-Lorraine goes to France.

The Saar valley will be temporarily internationalized and Danzig will be an open port.

Germany renounces all territorial rights outside of Europe.

Germany recognizes the independence of Poland and Czechoslovakia.

The German army is reduced to 100,000 men, and conscription within Germany is abolished.

The German navy is reduced to 24 warships and no submarines.

Germany may have only 10,000 troops in the Rhine valley.

Germany agrees to a large part of her merchant fleet to the allies.

Germany agrees to the trial of the Kaiser.

The dispatch of the surrendered German fleet, the German navy, to the allies.

The League of Nations becomes a future organization.

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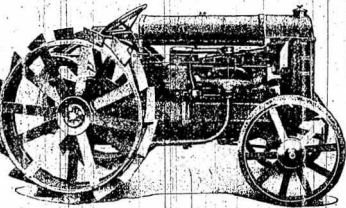
