Important News Events of the World Summarized

Sporting

Governor Cox, in a statement to his evening opponents of boxing in Ohio who had requested him to prohibit it, said: "I am doing my duty to the welfare of the people of Ohio by not giving in to the demands of the anti-boxing forces."

Personal

Samuel Gompers was reelected president of the American Federation of Labor in convention at Atlantic City, N. J., on Friday, and in a speech at the session he was American labor's "university to its traditions."

William S. Dooley, former chief of police of New York, fell dead at his home in Fort Lauderdale during a vacation. Mr. Dooley was sixty years old.

Peace Notes

The German government, in a statement to the press, said its willingness to sign the peace terms unconditionally. It was announced by the French foreign office.

The Italian government sent a peace delegation to Paris has been directed from Rome to accept the proposition for the settlement of the Italian-German conflict, and General Giacomo Pucciani and Lloyd George and President Wilson, according to the Paris office of Reuters.

Washington

President Wilson called Secretary Tammel of Washington that he expected to be in the city on Saturday, January 11, to attend the annual meeting of the National Education Association on Sunday, January 12. A Mitchell, Pennsylvania, general of the United States, was appointed to the senate judiciary subcommittee at Washington. He vigorously defended the bill, which he said, that with what he was asked, poverty could not be relieved, he sold the Bosch Magneto company, said to be worth \$100,000,000, for \$4,000,000.

An announcement was made at Washington that Secretary Baker had authorized the recruiting of 30,000 men for war on the Mexican border. This will be done in the interest of the war emergency.

Appropriations approximating \$300,000,000 for the army in 1920, instead of \$75,000,000 as voted by the house, were voted by the senate military subcommittee at Washington.

A London judge says most of the Great War dead are buried at the cemetery of the Commonwealth War Graves Commission, which established a committee to be appointed by the government to investigate the situation and to determine the best method of dealing with the dead.

The German naval high command has issued a circular to all naval bases ordering that the imperial eagle on the masts and standards be replaced by the British ensign.

Major Walter E. Evans has been appointed to the cabinet of the treasury, to form a cabinet, the Rome Gloriosa d'Inverno, to be appointed to the post of minister of war.

The Italian government met with defeat in the chamber of deputies at Rome when the chamber rejected a bill of confidence in the government by 50 to 20. The proposal was defeated.

The Catholic party was virtually the only party to support the proposal. The Socialists and many socialist parties made up a pale shadow.

It is reliably reported at Rome that the proposal could not be carried through because of the opposition of the Senate, which would produce millions of lire.

H. B. 61, Stabilizes—Makes it a misdemeanor to destroy food for human consumption, and authorizes the state to impose a fine of \$1000 for each offense.

The total amount of bills to be considered by the Senate is \$20,000,000, which should be added to the \$200,000,000 in the debt category and the \$90,000,000 in the revenue category, appropriated against the bond issue already authorized by vote of the people.
