EARNING MONEY NOT

MAIN ECONOMIC TASK

Even to save does not necessarily mean wise spending. The present day offers so many opportunities for earning money that a careful, systematic study must be made of both the advantages and disadvantages of each. It is a proper inference to be drawn from the different times in the average household where greatest desire to be made both ways meet; the other, the woman with unlimited means who desire to spend her money wisely.

There are two classes of households in which systematic saving is important and a suggestive budget will help. The first of these is the woman with a limited income whose greatest desire to be made both ways meet; the other, the woman with unlimited means who desire to spend her money wisely.

There are items in every household on which too much money is spent. The household budget of reduction in one of these which will be unjust to the family, and therefore, to place the proper proportion to the credit of this item. This must be forced, however, that if the family is to spend on an item such as shoes or clothing, less must be spent for other necessities of life.

The item which should be emphasized is the one on saving. On such occasions, less of time and money other demands will be made upon savings during the lifetime of the average individual, and unless proper provision is made for the future, the family for this most important item suffering and want will result. With the full of people who did not have a saving in their budget. No family, at least, that they are not to suffer the rack of shortage, should be without insurance. An insurance policy has stood between many a fatherless family and ruin.

Every successful enterprise is conducted on system. If the home is to be a successful institution it must also comply with this rule of wise economy.

Systematic household accounting will make a home more cheerful and prosperous. Household accounting, done, however, will never return its full benefit until it is made an intelligent family budget.

How to spend wisely the daily, weekly or monthly wage is learned by most of us through sad experience. The demands for food must be met, even though we spend less for shelter or clothing.

Where the total wage of the family (man, wife and at least two children) is \$100, to meet our present condition the household would need to spend in the city, and in the country, this amount would be reduced by skillful buying and by ruling vegetables and food for the garden.

On the lower scale it will be impossible even for the thrifty family to save much on the cost of food and still maintain the family in a state of health. On the higher salaries, from \$1,500 upwards, it is quite possible for the intelligent spender to buy and prepare food so that most of the family money may be saved either for investment or for other use in maintaining the family and in supporting community life.

Wherever rent is more than one-sixth of the income, it will pay to be held on the latter and the insurance on the investments, plus the depreciation, will be less than the amount spent for rent. Never more than 10 per cent of the income should be spent for rent.

Amusement and recreation is extra to family life. The child and the adult should have an allowance for recreation. The total may be very small, averaging from 4 to 6 per cent of the income of the family.

The contribution of the family to church should, if possible, be as large as can be afforded, but with the highest of living as it is, it is impossible on a low cost to maintain the family in a state of health and pay 10 per cent of the income for church and charity life.

The wisest spender plans the needs of the family so that the amount spent in miscellaneous items will be as small as possible. This item should not be "left all" in house needs.
