BILL TO SAVE GRASS LAKE LOTUS

Regulations to Save Rare Flower Will Be Presented to Legislature—
Hazen Fowler the Lotus

The beautiful lotus beds at Grass Lake are in full bloom, and visitors in great numbers are flocking to see them, and, as usual, tearing up large quantities of the rare flowers, root and all. But another year, if the bill now ready for introduction in the next session in Springfield is just enacted, the public will be permitted to plant and destroy these lovely flowers, for residents of the lake district are determined to preserve them.

While these beds of the Egyptian lotus have been here for years, it is estimated that numbers of tourists have been and rarely of the flowers have not been so appreciated, or at least the wanton destruction of the blossoms would be greatly lessened, if the preservation of them or any understanding of their value. When one considers that the whole world there are only two other lotus beds, one in Egypt and one in Florida, and that the lotus at Grass Lake is the largest of all, it would seem that not merely enough importance has been attached to the preservation and care of the Grass Lake lotus. Hazen Fowler has taken as well as others, the great lotus beds at Grass Lake, and he has been pulling up by the roots, by plucking the buds before reaching maturity, and by motor boats and gasoline launches running through and over the beds, thereby decreasing to a great extent the extent of said beds and curtailing almost all of those produced from year to year, so that at the present rate of destruction this beautiful flower will soon become extinct in this region.

It will make it difficult for any person to pull, cut, pluck, pick or take away any lotus from the shoreward waters any lotus buds, leaves, roots, pods or seed pods, or any other part of the lotus plant, from June 30, 1918, nor prior to Aug. 1st of each year thereafter, or until laws have been enacted to the lotus beds shall be pulled up at any time, and that no visitor to the lotus beds shall be allowed to more than one dozen flowers in bloom, and that no time shall be allowed to run gasoline launches be permitted to run through said lotus beds except in the regular and stated channels, and that no launch shall be allowed to pull or traffic in said lotus flowers.
