ability clause, making them payable at any time you may become totally or partially disabled from the performance of your act. No policy or endorsement issued by a private company contains a similar clause running beyond the age of 65.

You may engage in any occupation, no matter how hazardous, or may travel anywhere, without affecting your insurance.

No physical or medical examination is necessary for the conversion of policies. Physical examination would be necessary before you could obtain insurance from any other source. You may not be able to pass such an examination, or, if later you try to get private insurance, something may have happened to your health in the meantime and you may find it impossible to get insurance of any kind.

You may pay your premiums by the month (something you couldn't do in a private company) or, you may quarterly, semi-annually, or annually.

If you have allowed your insurance to lapse, all the rest of the reinstatement blank on this page of this issue of the Review and the revised and the reinstated policy will be sent to the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, Trustee Department, Washington, D. C., at once.

If you have failed to receive replies to letters to the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, repeat your letter and fill out and include the information blank published on this page. Your case will have immediate attention.

The bureau receives over 4,000,000 letters per year. It is important that you be as specific as possible.

For the benefit of discharged servicemen, the Review will conduct a questions and answers department, commencing next week. Ask anything you want to know about war risk insurance. If your question cannot be answered in this office it will be submitted directly to the assistant director of the Bureau of War Risk Insurance, who has agreed to try to get a reply by return mail. Your question should be plainly written and signed. The answer will appear the same or following week.

If you want an answer by mail, enclose two cents postage if you live outside of the village of Barrington; one cent if you live in the village.

If you must wait in line in converging your insurance, come in to the Review office and ask to see Mr. Pendleton. There will be no charge for any service rendered.

New Illinois Laws

No. Illinois Law enacted by the Fifty-first General Assembly, in effect July 1, 1919.

Installation of
Cities and Villages

City attorneys to be appointed by majority instead of being elected. City attorneys and municipal officers may regulate and classify buildings and maintain streets and sidewalks in incorporated towns.

Proceedings of Local Finance Committees subject to referendum statement, and of special comfort statement, and of levy of special assessments for payment of debts of incorporated towns.

Provision for exemption of incorporated towns from payment of taxes of more municipalities.

Provision for the issuance of certificates of incorporation for incorporation of cities and towns.
