The American Red Cross is preparing to launch the third Red Cross week, which will be held from Nov. 2 to 11, for \$40,000, 100,000 annual shares and \$100,000.

Was Pioneer in Canning Industry

W. W. Abbott of East Main street, veteran cannery factory operator, now vice president of the Canning Industry of Woodhull, Md., where he has been in cannery business for 30 years, has been elected to the position of vice president of the Canning Industry of Woodhull, Md.

Mr. Abbott has had a voluminous and interesting experience as a cannery factory operator and superintendent. He started work in a cannery at Upton, N. Y., in 1892, at the age of fifteen, and for twenty-one years he was superintendent of the Canning Industry of Woodhull, Md., leaving that place when he retired from active business in 1913. However, he has been called upon every year since that time for his instruction in some cannery factory, and has been busy at that work ever since. He was before he left Woodhull, Md., where he was before he left Woodhull, Md.

Under the heading of "Interviews With Pioneer Canneries," Canning News, a trade magazine, prints an interesting interview with Mr. Abbott.

Mr. Abbott started work in the cannery factory of the Onondaga company in 1892 when he was barely fifteen years. From there he went to a factory at Camden, N. J., where he was a millwright and put in the next year. He then went to a cannery or more other places in the north and learned the business thoroughly, he came to Woodhull, Md., in 1913, and as superintendent, started the south factory, now the Illinois Canning company. There he remained until March, 1919, accepting a position of vice president, a position which he held until 1924, during which time he was superintendent of the Iowa Canning company at Vinona, Minn.

Some Nine Meat

In the course of his interview he relates many interesting experiences.

"In 1895 I was engaged to go to Duluth, Minnesota. There I was about a factory being 'too dead to bury' it, that was it. They told me that a man preceding me had made nine meat with \$8.00 a gallon barrel, and they guessed he didn't put all the brains in the mince meat."

Now Original Credit Given

"The fall of '93 was the fall when the celebrated Cardiff Giant was discovered at Cardiff, Onondaga county, New York. That was great excitement. A laborer digging at Cardiff had unearthed a petrified giant seven feet long. This stone giant, you will remember, created much excitement all around the country in Barnum's circus and elsewhere and made a lot of money. When the story of the discovery we needed a horse and buggy and rode down to Cardiff to see it."

"About a year ago, when I was in California, they were exhibiting what they called the original Cardiff Giant. It was under a glass case, but I got a chance to touch it, and it was nothing but paper-mache. The original giant was stone all right, and this was the story of its origin."

"It was made at Medina, N. Y., cut out of Medina sandstone and shipped to Syracuse, and is now on exhibit at Cardiff, and it was carefully placed."
