## SOME FACTS ABOUT A LIBRARY TAX

WOMAN'S CLUB MEMBER EXPLAINS POINTS OF LAW

COULD UTILIZE \$1,000 LEGACY THEN

Management Will Pass Out of Hands of Woman's Club Library Tax by Voice

A member of the Harrington Women's club, writes about the library tax proposal and in the following article explains some facts of the law that are not generally known, current comment indicated.

"Some folks seem to have the impression that the money obtained by a library tax is to be used to erect a building. This is an error. Notwithstanding it could be done with the small amount secured in such a manner, the purpose of the tax is to secure small amounts of tax that may be levied for a library is one and capital funds for the library is another. The valuation of property (real estate and personal) is the basis for the tax. The amount of last year's tax, we could not hope for an income of more than \$1,000. Each year, tax, even now, only for books and the up-keep of the library."
