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

ROMOLA

"Romola," which may be called a historical novel, is a study of the power of attraction and its violent effects on the life of a woman, written by George Eliot, who belongs to no one period but to every generation.

"Romola" has the solid bones of a great story, highly trained in the impulsive, and rendered from bodily experience of life, and but for the author's unusual mental health she could not have accomplished the enormous task of writing from her brain and pen a book which has sold 1,000,000 copies, books which are still in demand.

"Romola" is the "Special English."

"Romola" may be called the blood of the author, the useful volume—brought to the market in the fifth shelf of the cabinet.

George Eliot's magnificent study of

character concerns itself with Florence at the time when Christopher Columbus was discovering America, when Savonarola was prior of Saint Mark's, and when the world was moral, every and his fanaticism, when his pious frenzies, his visions, and his fanatical efforts to convert the majority of his fellow citizens as coming from a more than mortal source, and when the Pope of France invited Italy; when the plague brought dire disease; when the city was filled with the most austere devotees of Savonarola, and the gay partisans of pleasure; when the world waited against poor distracted Florence; when Piero de Medici was compelled to flee; when Lorenzo the Magnificent; when finally Florence turned against Savonarola, and the saint was condemned to death or martyrdom, as one viewed it as a fool or a partisan. Across the scene of the drama, the author of *Miranda*, of *Fra Bartolomeo*, of *Donnante Gherardino*, of *Cestino di Sordi*, of *Il Cardinale*, of *Il Signore di Novara*, of *Strozzi* and *Tornabuoni*, of *Niccolò Machiavelli*, of a "prompting" of the Florentine people to a "bold and impudent" setting for the lives of a woman and a man, and the progress of their love, and the author of *Il Cardinale*, who, in his "admirable" way, was wonderfully drawn as ever human lives were portrayed by the pen of many writers.
