**PREPARE FOR CHRISTMAS**  
Because Christmas Day in the year of grace 1927 will fall on a Sunday and will be celebrated on December 25, the Postoffice Department started the "Shop Early Mail Early" campaign six weeks earlier than usual.

Notices were sent to all the post-offices in which carriers are employed that these hand-carried employees will be on duty the day on Monday to their regular dates. This is considered necessary owing to the probability that there will be an enormous accumulation of packages and greeting cards between the close of Saturday and the regular work of Tuesday, unless the appeal for early mailing of holiday packages is heeded.

Because most people desire that their gifts shall "not be opened until Christmas," the disposition among the great body of senders is to defer until the latest moment the mailing of their gifts. Resultant delay is inevitable.

"Early mailing is the solution of the problem," according to the statement issued by Postmaster General Bartlett. He advises all postmasters to "begin your campaign now and continue it until the last day before Christmas." Utilize every available medium of publicity, including newspapers, the radio, business and civic organizations, schools, ministers.

In this campaign the department will have the hearty support of every business house in the country, and that section of the public which is wise will heed the appeal.

**THE RIGHT TO BEAR ARMS**  
The United States has been criticized as a country of freak laws. Our people may go wrong occasionally through lack of information or misinformation on a question of public interest, but in the long run they think straight and act straight, and the best evidence of this fact is the 151 years of growth and prosperity which our nation has enjoyed.

The right of individual initiative and freedom from unnecessary restraint is freedom in every American citizen. For some time there has been an effort to curtail the ownership of small arms although the second amendment of the Constitution of the United States says: "The right of the people to keep and bear arms shall not be infringed."

Target practice and good marksmanship have been part of the American tradition and can be. Legislation to prohibit this on the theory that it would reduce crime is a mistake, for the criminal would still get his guns from sources outside the law. It is a matter of fact, more of the worst crimes are not committed with a gun. Hatchets, axes, clubs, knives and other instruments kill a greater toll.

In their honest desire to bring about law enforcement in this country, it is a question of whether the people will hastily adopt a measure which in the long run would make it easier for criminals to carry on their work.

**THE MANNA TRADE**  
Bible readers will be interested, no doubt, by the latest theory that the manna which the Israelites had in the wilderness was the product of a parasite of the famarik, but many will be surprised, perhaps, to learn that it is still gathered and used in considerable quantities. In Upper Mesopotamia, the Euphrates and the Tigris border the manna plentiful during September, October, and November, when the folk go out in the mornings and gather it by spreading sheets beneath the trees and shaking the branches. It is used as a substitute for sugar or honey, and the collectors find a ready sale for all they do not need for their own use. Bitia is the center of the manna trade, and the merchants there handle large quantities of the two chief varieties—white and green. The general belief among the natives is that the little white grains are from heaven in the form of dew.

**THINGS THAT COST LESS**  
The Monthly Labor Review published by the Federal Department of Labor is authority for the statement that electricity is the only element in the cost of living that has decreased since 1913. It is stated that the decrease at the end of June amounted to twelve per cent.

This is interesting, but much depends upon what is included in the cost of living. The Department of Labor properly takes into account only such fundamental things as food, shelter, clothing, heat, and light. But nearly twenty million families in the United States count the price of the family car and the expense of its upkeep as a major living cost. Millions of families have automobiles, and the radio apparatus is looked upon as a necessity rather than a luxury. A thousand dollars spent for a motor car today buys much more than it did a year ago. The price of the radio apparatus is also similarly decreased. The use of the automobile for purposes of business and pleasure has grown so rapidly that the demand for electricity for light and power purposes. Radio apparatus is similarly coming into more and more general use. In all these cases, reduction in cost are the logical result of continued efforts to better meet the demand, and an increase in the demand itself.

So much has been in these days about the high cost of living that it is a welcome relief to be told now and again of something that does not cost so much as it once did. Among the necessities in the home, electricity furnishes a case in point. The motor car which long ago ceased to be classed among the luxuries furnishes another. A third is supplied by the radio, and there are others. The common saying that "everything costs more today than it used to cost" is not true. Higher costs are the rule, but it is a rule that has its exceptions.

**THE WINTER BIRDS**  
The winter season and bitter weather are very hard on the birds, and they should be helped by providing them with food and shelter when the ground is frozen or covered with snow, with drinking water. Fine biscuit meal, millet, canary seed, millet, linseed, cheese, suet, bits of fat and other cheap things make a fine food supply for many species of birds, and bread, crushed dog biscuit, bread, remains of porridge and baked potato skins are all accepted by the birds. The birds are a continual entertainment by the acrobatic feats of the tits; if smeared with hard every few days it will remain fresh and soft. It is of course important that the food should be placed well out of the reach of cats.

In hard weather birds that are naturally shy and retiring lose their timidity in their own and impulse quest for food, and in this way a bird table is an easy means of making the acquaintance of the rarer birds.

An important point, and one that is not often realized, is to keep the feeding of the birds well into the spring, as it is not until then that their natural food is easily come by.

The birds work hard during the spring and summer with their busy and untiring beaks in helping the food grow. Not only do they get a reward for their work, but the interest of the consumer for them that they should be helped during the winter.

**THE BOY SCOUTS**  
It was less than twenty years ago that Robert Baden-Powell, retired officer of the British army, conceived the idea of creating a society of boys who were designated the "Boy Scouts." The idea was to instill a love of outdoors in the youth of England, to teach them to respect their elders, and in discipline and helpfulness. The idea soon spread to every country in the world where are boys, and that means everywhere.

Boy Scout troops grow like the proverbial green bay tree, as is shown by the reports to scout headquarters. On January 1, 1926, the total enrollment was 581,129 in the United States alone, which number had increased to 766,857 by January 1, 1927, and is still going strong.

As with all boy clubs, the inception of "scouting" was not enthusiastically received by the "grown-ups." Most fathers and mothers appeared to think that the scouts were to be a short-lived fad, and they learned otherwise, adults everywhere evinced great willingness to lend the movement enthusiastic support.
