U. S.-Mexico Boundary Line 1,833 Miles Long
The boundary line between the United States and Mexico was established by treaty in 1848 and has since 1852 been in dispute. It is 1,833 miles long and is one of the longest in the world. It is the longest in the world because of the Rio Grande from its mouth on the Gulf of Mexico to the Colorado river, the Colorado river to the Pacific, terminating a little to the south of San Diego, Calif. Mexico's maximum length is 2,500 miles; extreme width, 250 miles; narrowest point, the Isthmus of Tehuantepec, 129 miles. Atlantic coastline, 1,227 miles; Pacific coastline, 4,274 miles. It is about three times as large as Australia, Hungary, and nearly four times as large as France, or equal in extent to Great Britain and Ireland, Prussia, Germany and Austria combined. Exclusive of a number of outlying islands, its area is about 755,555 square miles. It is bounded on the east by the Gulf of Mexico and the Caribbean sea, on the south and southwest by Guatemala and British Honduras, on the west and northwest by the Pacific ocean and on the north by the United States.
