Plan Sought for Combining Funds in Barrington

Committee Reports Plan to Merge Water, General Departments

Discussion of the village bond plan which would combine the water fund and general fund was expected at an special meeting of the trustees Thursday night.

According to the tentative plan, village bonds would be offered for sale to raise money to take on the water bonds. If this were done it would be expected that the holders of water bonds would purchase the proposed general bonds.

During the last several years, the village "village" bonds have had trouble in holding general funds down to the amount of tax receipts, the situation growing out of the fact that tax collections have slowed up considerably and payment of tax funds by the Cook county treasurer has been even slower. The water department, which collects its money locally has public way and laid some money for retirement of water bonds.

The various village bonds have "traveled" from the water fund money to the general fund. The legal way of taking this action is for the water department to buy the water department bonds from the village. If the water and general funds were combined, it is probable that the general department would help meet the general expenses of the village without the necessity of anteriorly arranging or other devices for borrowing. In return, of course, the water department indebtedness would be retired and general village bonds would take its place. A committee of trustees, members including George H. Heese, Deschler investigated the bond plan and reported at the meeting.

The special meeting Thursday night was to be held just before a joint meeting of village trustees and school township trustees who are attending to regularly separate the village and township claims on a matter filed up in the closed First State bank. Attorneys Howard Brininger and D. B. Mabey were to be present at the meeting.

First National to Give Patrons New Checking Service

A new checking service will be installed at the First National bank of Barrington early in February with the introduction of the multiple check system which will enable any depositor to pay all of his local monthly bills with a single check.

Each monthly check has listed on it all business and professional firms and religious and educational institutions of Barrington. It also has blank spaces where the names of new firms in the village can be written in.

To pay local bills with a multiple check, a depositor writes the amount to be paid each firm opposite the firm's names on the check. The total of all bills is the total amount of the multiple check. When the check is cleared through the bank, the various amounts indicated at the several departments of the bank will notify the business firms of collections made in their favor.

This is a convenience which should help local residents keep their accounts straight and save them money by materially reducing the number of checks to be used. It should help local business firms in their collections.

Depositors desiring further information on the system may get it by inquiring at the bank.
