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Nearly All Merchants Add Tax "On Outside"

Thousands of food and meat merchants in Chicago and throughout the state began last week to add the 2 per cent occupational tax as a separate item of merchandise cost according to a statement released by Joseph Spino, chairman of the mercantile division of the Illinois chamber of commerce, the organization which has, since the inception of the tax, urged that it be kept out in the open for all establishment and economic reasons affecting both merchant and consumer.

Included in the group of food and meat merchants who are adding the tax are four of the largest chains of stores: The National Tea company; Great Atlantic & Pacific Tea company; Kroger-Grocery company; and the Jewel Food store, Inc. These outlets will also follow the same procedure in their department stores, thus cooperating with thousands of independent dealers who are already adding the tax as a part of merchandise cost.

Chameleon's Colors

It has been said that no one knows the natural color of the chameleon, for on a specimen may appear in half a dozen different dresses in as many days. If we place it on a green background, it soon becomes a similar green; remove it to a dark brown, and before many hours have passed it will correspond with its new surroundings. Many experiments have been made to determine how many dresses this quick-change artist can put on, but it usually baffles observers, for after many months of study, and when one thinks a record has been obtained of its wardrobe, it suddenly appears in an entirely new creation. If different colored light is focused on each side of the chameleon, each side will take on that particular color, while in the dark it takes on a cream coat.

Napoleon's Lucky Star

Everyone knows about Napoleon's belief in his lucky star, and how he communicated that sure faith to his armies and also to his enemies. He once actually said: "It is a great proof of the weakness of the human intellect that people should imagine they can read fate." It was, of course, one of the great factors in his career. His own brilliant strategy and genius and the mistakes of his enemies did not contribute more to the victories of Napoleon than did the steadfast faith so generally held in his lucky star which could not fail.

Used to Locate Sponges

Just as in other tropical islands, where native life of the land with edible fruits, herbs and vegetables growing profusely, a fair part of the Bahamas' natives manage to live on what the sea contains—but not on fish.

Essentially coral islands, the Bahamas are noted for the sponges which they produce. For years the sponging industry involved as many as 600 vessels and 3,000 men and women. Nations found they could live profitably by "sponging", for sponge, chiefly around Andros Island.

The fleet of boats usually is accompanied by flocks of small birds from which the natives do the sponging. Sponges are responsible for much of the success, for with them the natives are enabled to look through the clear water along the reefs and spot the sponge growth. Without them the dazzling sun and the water's ripples impair the vision. The buckets are not used for catching the sponge. Long, spoked hooks are used to break the sponge growth from the bars and lift it into the dory.

When it is cleaned and dried and taken to Nassau where the sponge exchange and packing houses are located.

Natives give their lives to sponge fishing as a profession just as in modern capitals men study law and medicine.

When Birds Awaken

A birdlover in France after studying the time birds rise in the morning, has come to the conclusion that if we were able to identify the singing of the innumerable birds in the countryside it would be almost possible to tell without clocks. All birds, say ornithologists, begin to sing at a fixed hour, which varies according to their kind. The reputation for being attributed to the lark is apparently not correct, for the greenfinch gets up exactly at half-past one in the morning. Then come the blackcap, starting the day with his warbling at half-past two; the quail at three; the blackbird at four; and then, a few minutes later, the thrush, robin, redstart, and the wren. Lastly, when the sun is high above the horizon, the sparrow and the tawny tit come.

Metathesis

Metathesis is the transposition of letters or sounds in a word. When the transposition is between the letters or sounds of two words, it is popularly known as Spoonerism, which a well-known specimen is: "Klumpke's Clogs their titles take."

Lined Artistic Weapons

Early in the Nineteenth century France was encouraged by Napoleon who presented arms de luxe to all his marshals in recompense to all his marshals. The luxury of making such weapons ceased with the downfall of the empire and shortly after the Emperor's gunmakers took away the superiority from France. During the second decade of the Nineteenth century the tendency of the gunsmith was to become a painstaking mechanic rather than an artist, and this tendency has persisted ever since, the enriched, yet not always reliable French giving way to the severely plain but highly efficient guns of today.

Plant Life of the Ocean

Plant life in the ocean was until the last few years thought to be almost nonexistent. Usually the greatest number of diatoms are right at the surface, where the sunlight is strongest. The top 600 feet or so of the water contains scarcely all the plant life of the ocean, and the next 600 feet below that contains all the rest.

Churches to Hold Special Services Throughout Lent

Local Ministers Tell Programs and Plans for Lent and Holy Week

Announcements of plans for the observance of Lent and Holy Week in Barrington churches, made by local ministers today, marked the beginning of preparations for special Lenten programs in this village. Each of the seven in connection with Lent, the duties of midweek meetings varying slightly in accordance with the weeks of the different congregations. Holy Week will be observed at union services, with each of the churches taking turns as hosts and each minister delivering one sermon. A cantata by members of the junior high school, in which the chorists will cooperate, will be held at the school auditorium the evening of Palm Sunday as a fitting tribute to the beginning of Holy Week. Rev. P. H. Beusher reports that the midweek church during Lent will be held at 7:30 p. m. every Thursday beginning February 15.

At St. Anne's church, there will be Lenten services at 8 p. m. each Wednesday and Friday evening and at 1:30 p. m. Sunday, starting Ash Wednesday, according to Rev. J. A. Duff.

The Baptists will function their usual Wednesday evening prayer meetings for additional devotionals and prayer during Lent. P. C. R. Druel.

A one hour service will be held at the St. Paul Evangelical church at 7:45 p. m. each Wednesday with organ music by the choir as a Lenten feature, according to Rev. H. E. Kowling.

The St. Matthew Evangelical Lutheran church which holds its services at 7:45 p. m. each Wednesday, will introduce a series of Wednesday evening Lenten services "in order to give an opportunity for a more intensive study of Christ's Passion and a more intimate communion with the Savior." The subject matter of the entire series will be "What Shall I Do With Jesus?" The first service, to be held at 7:30 p. m. Ash Wednesday, Feb. 14, will consist of the reading of the Gospels, the duties and subjects of the remaining Lenten services are as follows:

- Feb. 21—"Shall I Love Him?"
- Feb. 28—"Shall I Deny Him?"
- March 7—"Shall I Compromise?"
- March 14—"Shall I Crucify Him?"
- March 20—"Shall I Grieve Him?"

The last service in the series will be preached in a morning service on Good Friday.

The public has been invited to attend all of these services, according to the usual practice.

Visiting Nurse to Spend Tuesday, Feb. 20 Here

Clinic Hours: 1 to 3 p. m.

Mrs. Clarence Abbott and Mrs. Joseph Ebbelwill will assist Mrs. Cecil Kollman next week in making special appointments for a visiting nurse from the Cook county branch of public welfare who will spend Tuesday, Feb. 20 in Barrington. Mrs. Kollman, as chairman of the philanthropic committee of the Women's club, is furthermore, in charge of the clinic and nurse, a notice from the headquarters at Chicago has named this community that a minimum attendance of 20 warranted the holding of a clinic and the services of a nurse.

The clinic will be held in the foyer of the school building from 1 to 3 p. m. Tuesday, Feb. 20. The nurse will be Mrs. Deane Brooke in charge, assisted by some number of the philanthropic committee. The nurse will spend the rest of the day making calls at homes where residents desire advice concerning diets or methods of caring for children or invalids. Visits and consultations at the clinic are free of charge. Any child of pre-school age eligible for examination at the clinic.
