Glen Hager Qualifies for State Golf Finals at Champaign May 18

Glen Hager, Barrington high sophomore, qualified for the state golf finals to be held at Champaign May 18 and 19 by finishing among the five low scorers at the district meet held at the Sunset Valley club last Saturday. Hager shot an 82 to tie for fourth, the second and the 11th and 12th of Deerfield. A ruling allowing all ties to go down to the state meet made it not necessary for a playoff between Hager and Roach.

Shelton of Deerfield-Shields led the field of 54 prep colliers with an 81. Splitter of Oak Park tied with Flynn of New Trier with an 82, followed by Hager and Roach with 83's. The weather was ideal for the fairways of the course and the greens were slow. Hager shot the first nine in 40 strokes but had trouble on the second nine. He took a six on the 11th and blew an easy putt on the 18th to throw away chances of catching the leader.
