School Board Sets Opening Date for Monday, Sept. 10. Continued from page 1. building, chief of which are the creation of additional and needed cabinet and storage spaces. The first day of school on September 10 is considered as a regular day, according to Superintendent Erman S. Smith. All students are expected to come prepared for full day's work, he said. Failure to do so will be treated as an unexcused absence the same as it is on a later date. High school students must be completely equipped with books and supplies.

Registration September 7-8. Registration for high school students who have recently moved to the district and who did not register last spring may be handled at the superintendent's office on September 7 and 8. The rental system of books and supplies that was instigated last year in the kindergarten and lower grades will be extended this year through the sixth, seventh and eighth grades. Text books, pencils, ink, paper, crayons and all other supplies are furnished through the entire year to the pupils by the payment of a flat rate at the opening of the year. The system was an experiment in economy last year, and its success has resulted in its extension to the upper grades, Mr. Smith said.

Rental Rates Announced. A rental charge of \$1.75 is made for pupils of the kindergarten and first, second and third grades; \$2 for the fourth and fifth grades; \$2.25 for the sixth grade; \$2.50 for the seventh and eighth grades. Pupils are held responsible for the books and supplies that are entrusted to them during the year. Wastefulness of them will necessitate their furnishing their own. It was decided.

Local Bird Club Plans to Present 'Sanctuary' Again. "Sanctuary," a bird masque by Percy MacKaye, that was given in Barrington some years ago by the Barrington Bird club will be produced again this year. The masque was shown in the woods on the Hecht estate at its first presentation, and those who witnessed the performance were impressed by its loveliness. This time the play will have an equally appropriate setting in the gardens of Mr. and Mrs. Alexander F. Reichmann, and the performance should be even better since many of the actors who had part in the first presentation have consented to play their parts again.

The masque is a poetic appeal for the spirit of brotherhood between men and the so-called "lower" creatures, especially birds. The characters are a little girl, a faun, a poet, a naturalist, a wood nymph, a bird-maid and a plume hunter. The out of doors setting, in mysterious half lighted woods, with distant music makes a peculiarly enchanting experience for observers.

The masque will be produced about the middle of September. The cast will be composed of local persons, and the play will be directed by Mrs. E. B. Hammond who was in charge of the first performance.
