A new low-priced six now joins an improved straight eight to form the nineteen-model line of cars presented by the Pontiac Motor company for 1935. Closely approaching the lowest price field for the first time, Pontiac's two new cars should reap an increase of the total of the industry's business.

The wheelbase of the six is 112 inches as compared with 117 inches for the eight. In appearance, it duplicates closely the modern streamlining of the eight. Five distinctive body styles are offered on the standard six.

Both Pontiac chassis have ample power for the modern mode of high-speed travel. The six-cylinder engine develops 81 horsepower at 65 miles an hour while the straight eight delivers 84 horsepower at 70 miles an hour.

ing the facilities in Barrington and a permit was again issued by this board.

"After the system was constructed, the village was enjoined by certain property owners from emptying any effluent into the stream flowing through the village known as Flynn creek. This injunction places the officers of the village in a position of either facing contempt of court charges or endangering the health of the village by failing to furnish sanitary facilities.

"The village, at the present time, because of lack of market for municipal special assessment bonds, etc., is not in a position to finance this necessary project privately. The sewer reconstruction plans which have been proposed are designed to and believed to be sufficient to relieve the village from further financial embarrassment of question of disposing of sewage. Therefore, we believe that the nature of this project is such as should induce the most favorable consideration by the department.

"As to the financial ability of the village to pay the necessary rental charge—Barrington has in excess of 3500 people. It is surrounded by a rapidly growing estate district and the whole area is rapidly becoming a high class development.

"In spite of the depression, numerous transactions of estates have been occurring surrounding the village. The village itself has shown considerable activity by way of improvement. It is fair to say that Barrington ranks far above the average municipality of its size in so far as financial ability to carry such a project is concerned.

"The charge which the village proposed (for retiring loan) of \$15 to \$14 a year (rental per family) is nearly the same charge as is now being made for water; and this charge as shown on the table set up in our application would amply carry the loan."

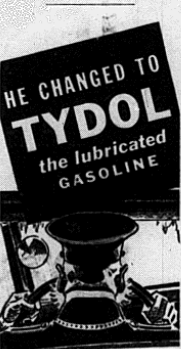
