Kelsey Charges Excessive Waste in State Relief

Cuba Supervisor Represents State Group Before General Assembly

The administration costs of distributing Illinois Emergency relief benefits in Cuba township amounts to a total of \$400 per month and is excessively greater than the administration cost of poor relief under the old system, H. D. Kelsey of Barrington declared in testifying before a joint session of the general assembly at Springfield Tuesday.

Mr. Kelsey, chairman of the Lake county board of supervisors, and James C. Cannon of Rockford, president of Whitehouse county, were selected by the county supervisors of the state to represent them in a campaign to reduce the cost of I. E. R. administration by eliminating waste and graft. The supervisors met at Springfield February 12 to crystallize their campaign. At that meeting they elected Mr. Kelsey and Mr. Cannon as a committee to lay their case before the legislature. The men delivered pointed addresses at the joint session Tuesday. Mr. Kelsey told the legislators that girls just out of school were paid at salaries of \$125 a month to administer the relief. He said the girls were entirely inexperienced in the matter and could not possibly understand the needs of destitute families as well as administer the relief needs as efficiently as could married men or women.

Administration of relief is a matter of setting a precedent to the destitute persons and not a matter of creating high salaries for men and women to do the work, he said. In this connection Mr. Kelsey said that in some districts of the state (notably Chicago) relief officials get as high as \$600 per month salaries, which represents a drop out into the funds which should be spent for the necessities of life for poor and destitute families.
