Engineering and Legal Expense of Sewer Explained In the report of the civic advisory committee, there appears some criticism of the engineering contract and also some suggestion concerning the fee to be paid for services in connection with the PWS application. I can only speak for myself in this matter. I take for granted that this criticism was made without even consulting the engineers or attorney committees as I know it has been the desire of the village board, to the best of my knowledge, to have the village and I hope that this is the attitude of the civic advisory committee. The village has in the past spent a very substantial amount of money with this sewer matter. Much of this expenditure has been in connection with litigation and seeming mistrust prior to the time I came to the village, mostly all of this expense has been incurred. Since that time, some expense has been incurred. The village has discharged a number of engineers and employees. It has also employed a special counsel in connection with the appeal. The village, to my knowledge, has paid approximately \$75,000 in its entirety to the village in almost as many cases or attorney they might consult. It goes without saying that engineers cannot work for nothing and the more that are discharged the more the cost of the sewer is to be borne. The village is to be commended in that it has endeavored to employ a new attorney, a new engineer on this sewer problem every time the completion of the village board changes. But it is no more than fair to the residents of the village that they should pay the bill. The former engineer who designed the sewer in 1931, something less than two thousand (\$2000) dollars. It is safe to say that during this period of time, I personally spent nearly more time than what the engineers did. I take it that the civic advisory committee does not assume that I am doing all of this work gratis. I have pointed out before, I have always desired to be fair with the village and still do. However, I must point out that I expect to be paid a reasonable sum for my services. I have heretofore received compensation in connection with the appeal. This, however, paid only for services in the preparation of the record, abstracts, briefs and arguments in the appeal case.
