Rental Charge of \$15 Per Year for Sewer Is Planned

Provisional Basis for Retirement of \$200,000 PWA Loan

The \$15 to \$45 per year rental connections to the sewer would constitute the basis of income for retiring the \$200,000 PWA loan. The board Monday approved the plan. Mayor David B. Maloney returned from a conference with public works and utility officials regarding the plan to Barrington. He said he believed that a bond issue to pay for the sewer system would be unnecessary. The plan is to be worked out by Mr. Maloney and the board. The number of homes to be connected to the sewer is estimated at 600. The cost of the sewer is estimated at \$200,000. The PWA loan is for \$200,000. The interest on the loan is 6 percent. The principal is to be repaid over 20 years. The board will meet again on Monday to discuss the plan.

11 Cases of Measles in Quarantine Now; Epidemics on Wane

Mrs. Hronek Testifies Snap Lock Trapped Seven Victims

News of the tragic fire at the Club Renaissance, Morton Grove, early Sunday morning, which brought death to six persons and injuries to thirty-four, affected local residents particularly when they learned that a former resident of this village, James Hronek, was one of the victims. Mr. Hronek had established a barber shop in a small frame building on East Main street, west of the present Atkins' Cafe, in 1923 and had operated the shop here until 1927 when he sold his business to J. Osborn, the present owner, who later removed the shop to the basement of the First National Bank building.

Assessment Fund Gets \$6875 Cash From Directors

Balance in Secured Notes Fulfills State Bank Board Bond

The sum of \$6875 was paid Wednesday afternoon to Attorney D. W. Maloney, representing the village of Barrington, by Howard Brantlinger, representing the directors of the First State Bank as the first cash installment from the directors bond guaranteeing the village account which was deposited in the bank. The directors through Attorney Brantlinger had agreed to pay \$21,000 to the village, \$5000 in cash and the balance in secured notes. However, a total of \$6875 was paid as the first installment. The balance in two year notes with collateral was deposited in escrow with the Chicago Title and Trust Co.

All Water Meters to Be Sealed; Ordinance Sets Penalty for Tampering
