### Mrs. F. W. Morf Dies Suddenly Saturday; Rites Held in Chicago

Mrs. F. William Morf, a resident of this community for the past twelve years, died at her lovely home, 248 Karfield street, early Saturday morning after an illness of only a few hours. She had suffered with diabetes for years and had several gall stone attacks but death was totally unexpected. After a busy day in the city Mrs. Morf had experienced pains about 5 p. m. Friday but medical aid furnished relief and she awakened about midnight and death followed an hour later due to complications which affected her heart. It was reported that her body lay in state at the funeral home, 1732 Wilson avenue, Chicago, until Tuesday at 10 a. m. when funeral services were held at Ravenswood Presbyterian church.

Nurses of Ravenswood hospital, a uniform attended the last rites in a body and Rev. F. L. Solten delivered the sermon. Interment took place in Rosehill cemetery.

Clara Nohls was born and reared in Chicago. She married F. William Morf October 12, 1904 and thus lived in the city, coming to Barrington each summer and fall after the spring of 1923. They moved to Barrington permanently in 1925, when their beautiful home "Shadow Ridge" was built on a country place southwest of the village.

Mrs. Morf is survived by her husband and one son, F. William Jr. An infant preceded her in death years ago. Musically inclined, Mrs. Morf gave freely of her talents and sang in church for years. She was a graduate of the American Conservatory of Music and had a fine contralto voice. She belonged to many philanthropic societies and musical organizations in the city and was active in church work. She joined the Barrington Woman's club October 18, 1928 and was the motivating spirit of the scholarship loan fund. Each fall benefit party for the fund was held at her home.

### Local Hospital to Close Doors May 15; Here 8 Years

Barrington General hospital will end eight years of service to this community May 15 when Miss Nellie Berghorn, superintendent, owner and manager of the institution closes its doors and puts the hospital equipment into storage.

During its history, 315 babies have been born at the hospital, numerous accident cases have received first aid, and there have been a number of medical patients.

The staff now comprises the following persons: Miss Berghorn, graduate nurse, Miss Gladys Johnson, graduate nurse on night duty, Miss Martha Naeber, graduate nurse, on part time duty, and Miss Flora Silker, cook.

The building, at 105 E. Lincoln avenue, has been fitted to accommodate five patients in private rooms and in addition, there is a nursery for infants, a first class room, an office, kitchen, laundry, and two bathrooms.

perment had on small truck and neager equipment. He proposed the measure for purchase of an additional truck to make the department more efficient. He also proposed that the village supply uniforms for the police officers as they had previously been without standard uniform.

### For Clerk

The race for clerk is between three popular candidates: R. A. Schroeder, Ed Langendorf and A. C. Barand. Arthur C. Barand, village clerk since 1920, has had five years of experience in the position during a time when several changes in book-keeping, accounting and collecting have been installed. He has given prompt, courteous service to all persons transacting business at the village hall and has increased the efficiency of the office for the benefit of the community. He has operated a store for several years and is familiar with business problems of the community. He is a member of the American Legion.

Ed Langendorf is at present postmaster, just completing four years service in that office since October, 1928, after passing a civil service examination. As postmaster, Mr. Langendorf has made many friends and established a good record. He has served as secretary of the district for four years and has been secretary of the Chamber of Commerce. He is a Legionaire.

A. C. Schroeder is a local insurance agent and a business man in Barrington of many years experience. He was active in the Schroeder Hardware Co. prior to entering the insurance business a few years ago. Mr. Schroeder has been president of the Chamber of Commerce, and is now secretary of the Merchants Clearing House association.

### Eight for Trustees

The trustees, listed in order of their dates of office follow: John Carroll—Mr. Carroll has been a member of the board since 1920. He first gained the spotlight by urging prosecution of the street paving bond affair. Mr. Blanke was elected last April for the one year term from the street paving bond affair.

H. D. A. Grobe—Mr. Grobe is a local hardware dealer and from length of service is one of the oldest merchants in the community. He has been a candidate for trustee when only 14 years of age. Members were elected, and on two occasions lost out by narrow margins.

Verdon Schroeder—Mr. Schroeder served from 1926-32 and 1933-35 on the board. As chairman of the lighting committee, he first worked out a plan for replacing ornamental lighting in the village as an economy measure.
