Classified Ads Bring Results

Northwest Towns Hold Quiet Vote; Bond Issue Loses

Palatine, Arlington Heights, Mount Prospect Hold Elections

Election, interest centering around Palatine, Mount Prospect, Arlington Heights, and Wheeling proved to be well contested but few changes of administration of great importance are recorded. In Palatine, 414 ballots were cast with Adolph Godknecht having 282 for president of the board. E. P. Steinbrink received 278 for village clerk. Trustees elected were: Arthur C. Brown, George Voss 289, Albert Schmidt 281, C. C. Uhrhammer 350, Louis H. Fretze 376 and Fred H. Shermier 373. William C. and Mrs. Martha Thompson were elected to the library board with 356 and 353 respectively. All those elected are present on all holders for which they were candidates.

Arlington Heights had several tickets running for various offices but only two new members for trustees and a new police magistrate won out. A total of 1721 ballots recorded gave J. D. Flettie 1274 votes to win the presidency. The village of Arthur L. McElhose received 1236 votes for clerk, George F. Schenker 1230 and Frank J. Burns 1221 (both elected for the first time) and Walter Kraus 1237, Gus Prambler 1283, George Helm 1211 and George Schaefer 1239, the old members of the office of police magistrate was filed by George Klopfer with 528 votes running on the Community ticket. Alfred Carpe and Henry Frank are voted as library trustees with 459 and 462 votes respectively.

The Community ticket in Mount Prospect won the village president's chair and four trusteeships against two trusteeships for the Citizens ticket. Herman Meyer defeated R. E. Gould for president. Herman Hase Sr., Edwin Wille and Edwin Hubenkamp are trustees on the Community ticket with R. H. Hase Sr. a village president. Edwin L. Hase was successful for village clerk on an independent ticket.

Mount Prospect rejected a \$15,000 bond issue for construction of a water treating system by 379 naves to 318 yeas.

Hans Schmidt, running on the Taxpayers platform, defeated E. Giescke, Peoples party, for the presidency of the Wheeling town board. Trustees were split with both parties carrying three seats. Edward Mochler, Charles Becker and John Wick were elected from the Taxpayers ranks with Jesse Poch, William Krueger and E. W. Wolfen chosen from the Peoples party. Adeline Schneider was voted as village clerk with no opposition.
