

Delinquent Tax Bills No Bar to Holding Office

Candidates for Office Must Be Free of "Direct" Debt to Village

One qualification for village office holders is freedom of delinquent indebtedness to the municipality but this does not include tax and assessment indebtedness, according to an interpretation from the attorney general received by A. C. Burdick, clerk.

In several communities of northern Illinois, the question of eligibility for office has been raised because of candidates being in arrears in their tax and assessment bills.

The attorney general interprets the statute covering village office to mean no one is eligible for office who owes a direct bill to the municipality, such as for water or gas and light. If the power company is municipally owned.

To disqualify a man from holding office because he is in arrears in his tax payments would be to discriminate against property owners in favor of non-property owners who do not have to pay taxes directly.

This subject was discussed at a special board meeting Friday night when the votes were cast.

Villages Told to Stop Pollution by Sewage in Preserve Streams

The all important question of sewage disposal is not alone a pet worry of Barrington people for villages using the 75 miles of streams flowing through forest preserves are warned that pollution must stop.

The demand is embodied in a resolution drawn by Clayton F. Smith, president of the board of forest preserve commissioners to be presented at the next meeting of the board.

President Smith's resolution in part follows:

Whereas, There lies within the preserve 75 miles of major stream courses, and 90 per cent of this is grossly polluted by sewage run off from villages and institutions, and this condition comprises a real menace to the health of the millions of people using the forest preserves annually, and

Whereas, through the passage of the federal public works bill funds are now available to municipalities for the construction of sewage disposal plants and this is set forth as one of the main objects of the federal public works program.

Therefore, be it resolved that the board of forest preserve commissioners request that the state sanitary water board proceed with all possible dispatch to enforce the laws with which they are charged with reference to stream pollution, and principally to secure the discontinuance of pollution from such villages as Elmhurst, Whiting, Gurnee, Elmhurst, Villa Park, Bensenville, Highland Park, Itasca and Deerfield.
