

JEFFERSON'S GREAT DREAM

The more closely you scan the trend of affairs in the United States over the past century, the more you must be of the opinion that the present era is the forerunner of a great transition in our theme of government. The result is that we now have a generation of voters, the majority of whom are produ generation of colors, the imports of whom are products of city industry; they do not know the feel of an ax as it clears farm land in a forest; they do not thrill to the turn of a furrow; they have no recollection of the beat of wind and rain and snow and sleet upon their bodies as winter tries to drive them from the conquest of Nature's elemental en-

The net result of all this reveals a majority of American citizens unable to appreciate the priceless heritage of free self-governing privileges: the resulting citizen apathy free seif-governing privileges; the resulting citizen apathy and disinterest therefore leave the way of government open to the demagogue, the predatory and mercenary politician; and unless human beings reform, you can figure out for yourself how and when some form of state piracy and dictatorship will eventually become sovereign in our beloved America.—Eccentric, Birmingham, Michigan.

For 12 years, the public had paid this man in cash because it had been unable to give him a chance to work. And after 12 years of that, Head refused to go to the trade school because he was "a waste of time."


