**Expense Caused by Grass Fires**  
Topic of Board

Chicago and North Western Turns Over Depot Land for Parking Lot

The hazard of grass fires on the expense entailed by the village when they are started through carelessness was the subject of discussion and heated discussion at last meeting Monday night in the small parlors of the village hall. Secretary of the first department, approved before the board to discuss the matter.

The major complaint was that the village should call the entire department out to small grass fires of bare village employes handle them if they are not too large. Firemen asked to be relieved of responsibility when not called immediately.

There are 20 volunteer firemen in Barrington. If they all respond to a call it costs the village \$4 in wages. Trustees hope to end the expense by having several men handle these calls.

Mr. Hicks told the board that the village yearly salary of a full fireman is \$35 after insurance is paid. No complaint was registered against the salaries but the trustees hoped to save unnecessary expense.

It was pointed out that there would not be such a condition if property owners exercised care in burning leaves and grass. Village employes have been burned by vacant lots to remove fire hazards.

C. A. Elsner, cashier of the First National bank, addressed the board asking for cooperation in having a mail box placed at the depot. Letters posted there at the post office closed could be picked up by a mail train going to Chicago in the evening.

Trustee John Daeschler presented a new contract for control over the parking lot behind the depot. The Chicago and North Western railroad has granted the village the right to use this lot as parking spaces. The agreement was accepted in a contract executed by Daeschler and seconded by trustees.

An employe's compensation insurance policy from Equitable Insurance company with a premium of \$212 was accepted following a motion of Hagar seconded by Koehler.

Trustee H. D. A. Grebe brought up the question of sidewalks and recommended that the board pass an ordinance letting the property in need of walks. After passage of the ordinance, property owners would have 30 days in which to do the work themselves or have the village take action. This matter was tabled until a later meeting.

A letter from the state highway department was read by Mr. Grebe. State officials are distressed by the use of bridges on the Hough street, in the case of the school house, discontinued.

Monthly bills totalling \$465.11 were allowed on motion of John Carroll, seconded by John Daeschler.

A resolution was passed accepting a change in labor conditions for work on the depot under the PWA. Previously \$0 per cent of all labor on PWA projects was to be taken from roller rolls. The new act will permit a great amount of non-rated help be employed.

A plan is being considered to landscape the grounds around the village hall. The Village Garden Club of Barrington is working out details.

The board adjourned until this evening when another session will be held in the council chamber to dispose of additional business.
