"Unfinished Symphony," "Anna Karenina" Included in Week's Billing

"Smiles" thru, which will have its final screening tonight at the Catlow theatre, has all the appeal of wistful, romantic drama enhanced by the acting of Norma Shearer, Leslie Howard and Fredric March.
