

# Broncho Varsity Track Team to Compete in Palatine Relays Saturday

## 10 Schools Have Entered Fourth Annual Meeting

### Heavy Competition Expected to Shatter Records Saturday

Ten teams have entered the fourth annual Palatine Relays to be held Saturday, April 25, starting at 10 a. m. A track and field program of 14 events is being sponsored this year with a total of 75 medals to be awarded the winning competitors. The meet will receive a trophy. Medals will be awarded to the first five places in the regular track and field events and first place awards will be given in each of three relay races.

The meet, which was won last year by Arlington Heights, will this year have as competitors in addition to the defending champion teams from Barrington, Bensenville, Crystal Lake, Geneva, Huntley, Libertyville, Palatine and Woodstock. All the schools except Loyden were in last year's meet.

Now events on the schedule this year are the Fresh-Soph 440 yard relay, medley relay, and 120 yard high hurdles. The meet starts at 10:30 p. m. with the pole vault and shot put but the track events will not start until 2 p. m.

The record made by Dr. Williams, '32, of BHS in the broad jump is expected to go by the boards. L. Stout has been shooting for the record in the pole vault for four inches and is favored to stretch out in the pit with a new mark. The other record held by a local athlete was made by R. Osborn, '25, who held the record of Arlington Heights in the 440 yard dash in the fast time of 54 seconds.

A full squad from Barrington will enter the meet. The loss of several star performers will hurt the local outfit's chances of making a large total of points. Carter, Elmer, Caldwell and several others are out of the meet due to illness.

### State Golf Championship to Attract a Team From Barrington High School

Boys of Barrington public high school are practicing up on their golf game preparatory to entering the district golf tournament at Wilmette May 2. The qualifiers for the district will then go to the state meet at Champaign May 15 and 16.
