BOUNTY ON RECKLESS DRIVERS

Here is the way they deal with reckless and intoxicate

Here is the way they deal with reckless and intoxicated drivers in Portland, Oregon.

There is a \$100 bounty on reckless drivers in Portland, where the law considers speeding reckless.

Determined to put a check on city drivers, the city, coperating with a civic accident prevention organization, enacted the bounty law recently as one phase of a wide spread

acted the bounty law recently as one phase of a wade spreau traffic control program.

The ordinance proides a \$100 reward for any citizen who gives information leading to the arrest and conviction of a reckless driver. The reward has been paid twice in the short life of the new regulation, adopted in April of this year.

As another safeguard, the city has obtained an agreement from major gasoline companies not to sell gasoline to intoxicated persons. The city also conducts a school where reckless drivers are taught safe driving methods.

These unique regulations ought to help in the safety first campaign. Cities might well take the idea and try it is the core ordinances. Reckless and drinking drivers
