BETTER CHANCES

Exceedingly good news awaits the college graduates of 1986. University departmental heads, who usually have advance information on possible jobs for senior students in their departments find more jobs are open for them than at any other time since 1931.

any other time since 1931.

Agriculture, industry and business are looking for college graduates this year. Many business and industrial organizations have been faced with a gap in their personnel forces because of depression economics. As a result, not only are there four times as many requests for college graduates this year as in 1935, but the starting wage level has risen.

Whereas the top salary a young graduate could expect last year was \$100 a month, compensation this year is \$125 for the best positions and \$100 for "average" jobs. Those

This represents the beginning of a foothold for youth. The absence of that foothold has been one of the great tragedies of the depression.—Iowa City, Ia., Press-Citizen.

STILL GOING STRONG

It appears now that the American public has weathered the depression pretty well, after all. At least, says Dr. James S. McLester, president of the American Medical association, a nation-wide survey shows that no widespread under-nutrition likely to affect the general health has developed from the hard

times.

On the contrary, he tells us, the American people seem to have learned a very good lesson from the whole affair. Economic misfortune became the mother of a more enlightened and practical viewpoint on diet and survival.

"Here we have, on one hand," says Dr. McLester, "the fact that we have suffered great material losses during the last five years, while, on the other hand, there is no clear evidence that the nutritive state of any appreciable number of procedure is inferred to that of procedures in days. GOING ON

In a 5 to 4 decision the court follows its precedent set in 1923, when an earlier minimum wage law was invalidated. The new law had based the minimum wage on fair value of services and a living wage; the old one on a living Grounds for the decision: The "due process" clause of the constitution protects the right to make contracts, and this right can be ratireted only under exceptional circumstances. In this day of equal rights, women of mature age do not require protection to the point right; currently currently contracted to them and to their employers.
