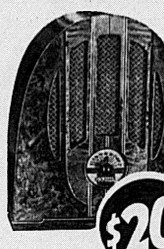

## Announce Plans for Utility Groups Merger

Commonwealth Edison company the consolidated capital structure of the group of companies, all of which supply utility services in the great metropolitan area in Illinois, of which Chicago is the hub.

Each of the four plans, however, approved for a separate purpose and will be carried out independently. The plans are, of course, subject to the approval of the Commonwealth Edison company stockholders and of the Illinois commerce commission and to the appropriate proceedings before the Securities and Exchange commission at Washington, D. C.

The board of directors of Commonwealth Edison company at a meeting held last Friday authorized the calling of a special meeting of stockholders of the Edison company to be held Saturday, Jan. 23, to vote authority for the board to proceed with each or any part of each plan according to its best judgment.

Whether or not plan No. 3 and 4 will be consummated depends on the action of the stockholders and the Public Service Commission and on the then prevailing conditions of the money market.

The first plan contemplates a reduction in the par value to Commonwealth Edison company capital stock from \$100 a share to \$25 a share, each of the present shares to be changed into four shares.

The first three plans involve the possible issuance by the Edison company of all or part of about 5,425,000 shares of new capital stock and all or part of \$115,200,000 principal amount of convertible debentures. Assuming that each of the first three plans are consummated and the debentures are fully converted into Edison capital stock, there will then be outstanding approximately 12,475,000 shares of new stock of which about 6,000,000 shares will be attributable to the new financing.

It is not intended that Commonwealth Edison company should acquire direct ownership of the physical properties of any of the companies. Neither is the merging of the operating organizations and personnel of the company contemplated.

The predominant ownership interest in the three generating companies by Edison and Public Service, with their own large generating stations, assures for the Chicago metropolitan district not only efficient generating capacity. But also what is equally important the additional capacity that can be installed through future development of the most favorable areas.

Besides accomplishing the primary objective of simplifying and balancing the consolidated capital structure of the group of companies, the program points to the secondary consideration of laying the groundwork for the possible ultimate segregation between the existing companies of the gas and electricity business in the suburban territories (as has already been accomplished in the city of Chicago), which preliminary reviews indicate to be worthy of serious further study.

## Sale of Licenses in Village Gains

Dealers automobile tags increased from 9 to 12 while tax licenses dropped from 10 to 6.

The sale of dog tags also increased considerably when 199 were issued by A. C. Burandt, village clerk, this year as compared to 129 last year.

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## Youth Victim of Shotgun Accident on Jackson Farm

E. Schmidt, 22, Elgin, Dies of Gunshot Wounds at Hospital Monday

Elmer C. Schmidt, 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Schmidt, 210 Margaret street, Elgin, died a short time after he had walked into the path of his friend's discharged shotgun while hunting on the George Jackson farm, five miles west of Barrington, Monday afternoon.

He received chest and abdominal wounds which caused his death shortly afterwards as he was being carried into the Sherman hospital.

Paul Smith, 21 years old, 123 Illinois street, Elgin, fired the shot which took his companion's life. The two boys, accompanied by Miss Gladys Alexander, 730 Douglas avenue, Elgin, had been on a hunting and hiking trip and were about to return to Elgin when the accident occurred.

Having been unsuccessful in sighting any game, they were preparing to return to their car when Smith said he decided to shoot the shell which he was carrying in his single-barrel 12-gauge shotgun.
