

"Sit-Down" Strike Halts Zion Work

A "sit-down" strike is tying up all activities of Zion building industry at Zion with more than 25 workmen of various building trades being affected. The men have taken possession of the big mill and yards, which are situated on "Pine" street between Chicago and North Western tracks, and they declare they will remain there until officials of the Zion Industries, Inc. of which President, Wilbur Chase, is president and general manager, recognizes their union organization recently formed. This recognition naturally means an increase in wages of the mechanics to the prevailing union scale elsewhere in Lake county.

This is the first labor union in Zion, with the exception of the lace weavers, who were organized last year. Carl J. Jankowski, a truck driver for the building firm, is president of the new organization. N. Wesley Eshaw, a timar and steamfitter, who was for many years a private chauffeur for Overseer Voltra, is a trade union organizer in the industry together with Secretary Harold Burns, called the strike leader.

President Michael said funds of Zion Industries, Inc., had refused to recognize the labor unit and the L. A. L. B. has taken a trade federation and said "we are only making an effort to bring them to the terms of agreement."

When asked whether or not officials of the industries had sought a parley with the union workmen, Wilbur Chase said, "Not they have not, but when they did they would have come to terms with their plans they will soon be made." The fact that the industries and the sit-down strikers refused to allow any work to be done until the strikers were released after two or three trucks were loaded, has caused the situation to become more serious.

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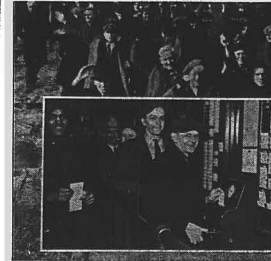
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Scenes as Chevrolet Workers Return to Their Jobs

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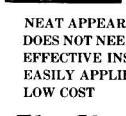
