LABOR SINCE THE NRA
Proposals to revise the NRA, to establish a 30-hour week and to reduce the hours of the week as proposed by the Walsh-Hesley government contracts act, combine to make particularly timely the study of changes in wages, hours and production since 1918, compiled by the National Industrial Conference board.

The gains in volume of production and industrial prosperity since the supreme court declared NRA unconstitutional in May, 1935, are too well known to call for further emphasis. The gains of labor are also striking.

Under the NRA hourly wages were advanced nearly 42 per cent. When the NRA was through, it was widely declared that the laborer had won. Exaggerated rumors of wage cuts were frequent. But on the average, there was no reduction in hourly wage rates since NRA terminated. Average weekly earnings, which mean more to workers than have any increase in the number of hours worked in the NRA period. Even when allowance is made for a slight increase in the cost of living since then, the purchasing power of wages in September, 1936, was still 8.4 per cent higher than the average during the period of the NRA. And though it was contended that the NRA, through the device of the shorter week, had created employment, the record shows that employment now stands at 85.5 per cent of the 1929 level against an average of 75.1 per cent during the NRA period.

These (and other facts) serve more to indicate one of the purposes of the proposals to establish the 30-hour week. Proponents of the proposal overestimate the actual length of the working week at present. This factual misconception is wholly apart from the direct violation of elementary common sense which the 30-hour week involves in principle. Wages can be paid only of the product that labor helps to make. There is no way it can get more by producing less.—New York Times.

LAWFUL PURPOSE
The legal status of the simple strike has been definitely settled in favor of its legality if the strike is for what the courts call a "lawful purpose." The supreme court of the United States in 1921 said:

"The right to combine for such a lawful purpose has in no way been denied in any court. The strike because it is a lawful instrument in a lawful economic struggle. There is disagreement, however, on what constitutes a lawful purpose. All courts agree that such purposes include strikes for better wages, shorter hours and improved working conditions.

Where the self-interest of the employee, which makes such purposes lawful, is one more step removed, as when the strike is for the device of justice, it is not a lawful act. The courts of New York have ruled that unionism, too, is a lawful purpose, "sufficient to justify the harm." Modern economic organization, the court of appeals has said, "is not based on the single shop. Unions believe that wages may be increased and collective bargaining maintained only if union conditions prevail, not in some single factory, but generally."

Picketing and its legality have been a prolific source of legal controversy. Again the courts agree that picketing is a legitimate means of economic coercion if it is confined to the lawful purposes. However, so the lawful scope of this means. United States Supreme Court, 1932.
