NAILING A HALF TRUTH

Several friendly critics have been kind enough to write to express their dissent to a statement made that "while state courts had been passing upon the validity of acts of legislatures under their power of judicial review, at no time during the constitutional convention was any proposal made to place in issue the constitutionality of state courts."

That same statement has been made in the congress this last month. It is always a basic part of the argument of those who believe that congress and the president themselves should have the sole right to determine the validity of their own laws.

While no official spokesman who has thus far appeared before the senate judiciary committee has disputed the power of congress to pass upon the constitutionality of state courts, this statement to show a contrary intention on the part of the founders as to the proper function of the court has become a part of the present controversy. It is part of the campaign to discredit the court completely in the eyes of the public.

Was such a proposal made on four occasions? If the delegates rejected a motion to put in the constitution explicit language that the court shall pass upon validity of acts of congress, then in good faith they rejected the proposal. The proposal was made more or less once.

There was a motion made at the convention and rejected four times (June 8, 1787) and that motion was rejected. But it was not a motion to the effect that the judicial power be made more specific. No such proposal was ever made and rejected.

The constitution grants to the judicial power to be "vested in one supreme court, and such inferior courts as congress may from time to time ordain and establish." This is a very different proposition from the power of judicial review which the founders wished the court to have.

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John Doe criticizes congress. He is arrested and sent to prison under the act of congress. He appeals to the supreme court on the ground that the constitution grants congress the power of speech. The attorney general of the United States contests it on the ground that John Doe was arrested under an act of congress.

This is the case before the supreme court on a question of respect of legal rights. The court places the act of congress beside the constitution and finds they are inconsistent. It decides that the constitution, being the "supreme law," must on the ground that the constitution grants congress the power of speech.
