

I. Lageschulte Is Pastor of Sutton Community Church

Replaces Rev. Engelskirchen of Park Ridge; Taken Pulpit April 4

Ivan W. Lageschulte, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. G. Lageschulte, 314 W. Sutton street, was appointed pastor of the Sutton Community Bible school church in Barrington township by a committee of church members this week. He replaces Rev. Harvey Engelskirchen of Park Ridge, who has been in charge of the church for the last three and one-half years. Mr. Lageschulte will take over his duties on the first Sunday in April.

Mr. Lageschulte was graduated from the Barrington high school in 1924 and received his theological training at Dudley Bible Institute, Dudley, Mass.; Moody Bible Institute, Chicago; Evangelical Theological Seminary, Naperville, and Wheaton college, Wheaton. He was pastor of the Evangelical church in Northfield for one year and at the Palatine Evangelical church for two years. Later he turned over the pulpit to Donald Landwehr, also of Barrington. For the last year and one-half he has been filling various pulpits in the nearby communities and has been active in Sunday school work of the Salem Evangelical church in Barrington. Rev. Engelskirchen will devote his entire time to the Mt. Forest Bible church in Willow Springs in the future. He has been dividing his time between there and the Sutton church for several years.
