**Master Gardener
Explains Method to
Battle Weedy Lawn**

BY THE MASTER GARDENER

One of the best ways to combat weedy lawn is to make conditions ideal for the growth of grass. This means, among other things, furnishing an ample supply of plant food for the hungry grass in early spring, just as soon as the plant food can be applied without marring the surface of the lawn.

To impress upon you the importance of feeding in combating weeds, I am quoting below extracts from leading experiment station bulletins, emphasizing the "Weeds in a lawn may be kept down in a large extent by proper fertilization each year. If there is a good soil, properly fertilized and heavily seeded, the weeds and wild

grass will not bother as much as on poorly cared for lawns."

"Unless the lawn sod is kept as dense and vigorous as possible through adequate fertilization and good care, crab grass will crowd out everything else during July and August. Dandelions, plantain, chickweed, and self-seed are at least partially kept in check by adequate fertilization.

"Heavily turf is dependent in large measure on maintaining a comparatively high state of soil fertility by proper management of manure, prevention of drought injury, avoidance of disease outbreaks, and resistance to insect attacks are all intimately related to the proper use of fertilizers."

"Weeds should be controlled by proper feeding of the grass for in nearly all cases they indicate an open turf which is a result of a lack of soil fertility."

"Careful attention to fertilization, which keeps the grass thickly, will go a long way toward weed control."

"In fighting weeds, as well as in any other battle, the best defense is a good offense. Lawns that are

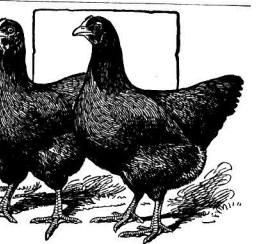
