## Supt. N. J. Puffer Addresses First Meeting of P-T. A.

### Division of Responsibility Between Home, School, Is Urged

The definite need of parents and teachers to share the responsibility of each child's development was stressed by Noble J. Puffer, county superintendent of schools, in his talk to members and guests of the Parent-Teacher association at its meeting in the school auditorium Tuesday evening.

"It is essential that they work on common ground. A child reflects his home atmosphere. Sometimes, in group situations, the teacher finds qualities lacking which should be cultivated. Quietly, diplomatically, without calling attention to the facts, she gets about remedying faults. By cooperating, parents may help in the development of character." Superintendent Puffer said.

Songs by Miss Pauline Berger, accompanied at the piano by Mrs. W. D. Dotterer, group singing, led by Miss Adelaide Ewing, and reports by chairman of committees completed the program after which an informal reception was held and refreshments served.
