

Funeral Services for Mrs. Rose Black at Hood River, Oregon

The body of Mrs. Rose Black, who had been missing since Feb. 23, was found in the Columbia river at Hood River, Ore., on April 5, according to word received here by her brother, Joseph D. Robertson, assistant postmaster at the Barrington office.

Dr. Black, a former practicing physician at Palatine, died at his home in Hood River on February 24. Mrs. Black disappeared four days later while enroute from her home to the railroad station to meet her brother who had gone to Hood River to attend funeral services for Dr. Black, and with the expectation of bringing his sister back to Barrington with him. Mr. Robertson attended to last rites for Dr. Black and remained at Hood River a number of days, conducting an extensive search for his sister, without result.

Mrs. Black was the eldest daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Silas Robertson, well-known pioneer residents of the Barrington-Lake Zurich community. She was married to Dr. Black forty years ago, when they moved to Oregon. They had no children. Besides the brother mentioned, Mrs. Black is survived by another brother, Lloyd

Robertson of Carlisle, Ark., and three sisters, Mrs. Charles L. Hutchisson and Mrs. Ray Cannon of Barrington and Mrs. Emil Myers of Decatur, Ill. Funeral services for Mrs. Black were held at Hood River, Ore., on April 6.

Rites for Frank L. Wells, 58, Sunday

Funeral services for Frank L. Wells, 58 years old, were held at the chapel, 149 W. Main street, Sunday at two o'clock and burial took place in Evergreen cemetery.

Mr. Wells was attending a banquet for officials of the North Western railroad at the Stevens hotel last Wednesday evening when he was stricken. He was taken to the Edgewater hospital where he died ten minutes later.

Mr. Wells had been an employee of the North Western railroad for more than 30 years and at the time of his death he was signal supervisor with 300 men under his supervision. He had been in good health but the heavy snow storm of last week had caused him great anxiety.

Mr. Wells was born in Wauconda and had spent his entire life in this vicinity. His widow, two daughters, two brothers, and two sisters survive him. The parents, and two sisters preceded him in death.

portant, pass their tests and requirements.

The boys offer about the same suggestions:

"If you have only one suit and one pair of shoes, at least keep them clean and neat. Appearance and willingness to work are two very important factors in obtaining a position. Don't be afraid to speak up, but don't talk too much. Opened eyes and ears are better than an open mouth."

"Personal appearance. Show determination and don't be too specific in trying to get a certain job in a large plant or business. Get inside and then show your capabilities; then ask favors that would lead to the desired spot."

"Make innumerable applications. Use good common sense in your appearance and conversation when interviewed."

"A good appearance, self-confidence, and correct English in the interview. Also use neatness and correct English in filling out applications."

"Neat appearance. Conversational ability. Pleasant personality. Following up on all contacts—proper use of friends. Most display of all assets. Have proper educational background."

"Not too high or low a self-rating. Willingness to learn from the bottom up. If possible select work which you enjoy and where you will not be a drudge all your life. Do more than the very least which is required. A pleasant disposition and an ease in meeting people are invaluable."

"Be neat and punctual. That will impress the person who is doing the hiring so that you might get a chance before someone who also wants the same job."

"The most important is to show your employer that you can be of real service to him."

"Don't talk any more than necessary, but when you do, tell the truth."

"Foreign, cleanliness, neatness, accuracy, promptness. Try to find the work that you like before applying, if you are going to stay with it very long. Don't give up when the going is hard, and you get a door slammed behind you. Have confidence in yourself."
