

Lake Villa Resident First Lake County 1938 Auto Fatality

Mrs. Helen Pierce, 64 years old, of Lake Villa, became the first auto fatality in Lake county in 1938 when she died from an injury received in a crash near Half Day Saturday evening. The dense fog that covered highways in northern Illinois was blamed for the crash.

Mrs. Pierce, who died Sunday morning at the Highland Park hospital, was a passenger in the automobile driven by John Torgensen, 4123 Kilbourn avenue, Chicago, which was traveling south on Milwaukee avenue. South of route 22 the machine collided with one going north on Milwaukee avenue and operated by Mrs. Donna Novak, 31, of Prairie View. Mrs. Novak was accompanied by her husband, Clifford.

In the Torgensen car in addition to Mrs. Pierce were Mrs. Alice Gray, 4662 Colmar avenue, Chicago; her husband, Arthur Gray; Erma Ritzman of Sterling, and Mrs. Torgensen. All of them suffered cuts and bruises and were removed to the Highland Park hospital.

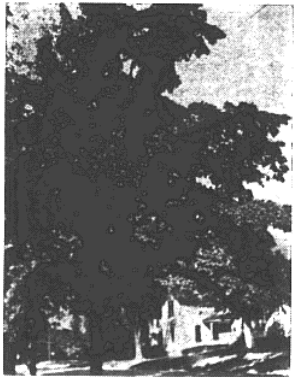
W. Schumachers to Have Golden Wedding
