

Youths Injured in Crash Not Able to Describe Location

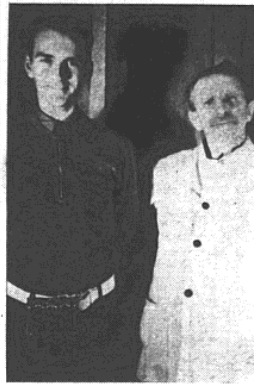
Three young men were injured in an accident which was reported to have occurred near the intersection of route 14 and Barrington road Sunday night. The driver of the car, Melvin Christensen, 20 years old, of Norwood Park, was confined to the Sherman hospital with severe lacerations about the face and head and contusions of the back.

Two companions, Edward Henk and Fred Kaegbin, were held in the Elgin city jail hall after receiving medical treatment. Another member of the party, Walter Henk was released.

State Patrolmen William Sullivan and John Stanton reported the four youths were intoxicated and said they could not remember where the accident occurred. It was believed by the police that the car went into the ditch near the intersection of route 14 (Higgins road) and Barrington road.

Commission Orders C. & N. W. to Install Crossing Protection

News that the Illinois Commerce Commission had ordered the installation of gates at the Des Plaines avenue crossing of the Chicago and North Western railroad in Des Plaines last week was received favorably last week by residents of that community.

After many months of campaigning by civic bodies in Des Plaines to have the crossing protected, Ken Meyer, attorney for the city of Des Plaines, reported at the council meeting last week that the commission had taken the desired step.

"The railroad crossing at Des Plaines avenue has been the scene of numerous fatal auto-train collisions in the last several years, and it was an effort to prevent a further recurrence that motivated the plea for gates."

The plan outlined will retain the flashing signals already installed, and in addition, a set of gates are to be constructed. The power-operated gates and flashing signals will function 24 hours a day.

Pick successfully contended that Druggan defaulted on a payment under his contract and he was entitled to the property.
