President Harrison Had Honor of Many 'Firsts'

William Henry Harrison, third President of the United States, had many "firsts" attached to his name. He was the first President, writes R. A. Barry in the Washington Post. He was the first delegate to Congress from the Northwest territory. He became the first governor of Indiana territory when that tract which included what is now Indiana, Michigan and Wisconsin in the old Northwest territory was split off from Ohio in 1801, and when the administration of most of the Louisiana purchase of 1803 was added to his duties he had almost equal power over the vast tract from Ohio to the Rocky mountains and from the Canadian border to what is now Louisiana, a territory then larger in area than all of the other states and territories combined.

President Adams appointed Harrison secretary of the Northwest territory, which position he resigned to serve as the territory's delegate to Congress. Until then public lands had been sold in such large tracts none but the wealthy could buy. A situation which Harrison believed would end only in scandal. To correct this he obtained the passage of a law which made it possible for men of small means to obtain home lands direct from the government. An act which greatly stimulated settlement in the newly opened lands. It was at this same session of Congress that the Indiana territory was formed, of which President Adams made Harrison the first governor. An office which in addition to civil duties included the administration of the public lands, military and Indian affairs.

It was from Vincennes that Harrison conducted his successful campaigns against the Indians and Tecumseh and against the British in the War of 1812 that won him the popularity which resulted in his election to the presidency by an overwhelming majority in 1840, an honor which he was destined not to enjoy for long since his death came a month after his inauguration made his term the shortest of any of the Presidents.

Firstborn's Right of Inheritance  
Primogeniture, a legal term, means that the eldest son has the sole right to inherit his father's title and property. That was the reason for this law in days when family safety lay in great wealth. If a lord's estates were divided among all his sons and later their sons, the family lost its power. Primogeniture made the eldest son head of his family and tacitly implied that he would protect his poor relatives.

### Lowering Assessed Valuations

#### Is Cutting School Finances

Real estate, personal property and railroad property assessments in Cook county as a whole, outside the city of Chicago, are less able to support education today than they were either in 1927 or 1930, according to a study of school finances made by the Lake Shore division of the Illinois Education association.

Assessed valuations per pupil in average daily attendance, the study shows, averaged \$5,437 in 1927, \$4,449 in 1930 and \$4,325 in 1932. In the country towns in general, in the Barrington school district the assessed valuations per pupil amounted to \$7,648 in 1927, \$5,135 in 1930 and \$5,571 in 1932.

"The figures for 1932 show that the average school child in the United States received an educational program costing \$74.30," the study states. "If Illinois is satisfied with an average educational program it will require \$4,453 in assessed valuation behind each child. In the country towns, the tax rate of \$.50 for each \$100 of assessed valuation) from the present tax sources, which, when apportioned by \$7.50 from the state distributive fund, will provide an average educational program for Illinois boys and girls." (While Illinois theoretically distributes \$11 per elementary school child, in Cook county only an average of \$7.50 reaches the school, the association has found.)

In making its study of assessed valuation trends in their relation to Cook county school finances, the association found that railroad property as a source of revenue for schools is rapidly disappearing. Finding that many school districts are now finding it necessary to tax the local limit and finance a part of their budget from delinquent taxes and that if the present general trends continue budgets must either be reduced or new sources of revenue be found. Thirty-four states, it was pointed out, are meeting the problem by providing more state funds for education. The state of Illinois, the national average being more than \$26 as compared with Illinois' \$11 per child.

The association found that in the Barrington school district, which had an average daily attendance of 391.8 in 1927, the total assessed valuation of \$2,998,128 included \$2,560,692 of real estate, \$437,436 of personal property and \$122,520 of railroad property. In

1930, with an average daily attendance of 389.95, the total assessed valuation was \$3,894,146, which included \$3,159,324 of real estate, \$499,445 of personal property and \$235,377 of railroad property. In 1927, with an average daily attendance of 384.48, the total assessed valuation was \$3,155,427, including \$1,000,352 of real estate, \$294,641 of personal property and \$90,434 of railroad property.

Expressed in percentages of the 1927 figure, these figures show that the real estate valuation was 134 per cent in 1930 and 43 per cent in 1927, that the personal property valuation was 118 per cent in 1930 and 70 per cent in 1927 and that the railroad property valuation was 105 per cent in 1930 and 40 per cent in 1927.

### Flag at Half-Mast

The display and use of the flag are governed by tradition and not by law. The federal government has by statute provided only against the desecration of the flag. The army and navy have their own regulations, but have no authority to enforce them in civilian use. Civilian regulations are embodied in the Flag code, adopted in 1923 and conference of patriotic and educational organizations under the auspices of the National Americanism commission of the American Legion. The laws have not only been sanctioned. The origin of the custom of displaying the flag at half-mast as a mark of mourning and respect dates back several centuries. According to flag etiquette, when a national flag is placed at half-mast, it is first raised to the top of the staff or flagpole, and then slowly lowered to a position at or near the middle of the staff.
