Locals Suffer Third Defeat From Bats of Bartlett Sunday, 4-0

The Barrington baseball team again dropped a game to Bartlett, this time by a score of 4 to 0, at Bartlett last Sunday. This was the third straight loss to Bartlett, the scores of the other games being 5 to 3 and 13 to 1.

H. Storm of Bartlett pitched the shutout game, holding the locals to six scattered hits and striking out nine batters. Al Heitman hurried for the locals and got away only five hits. Four runs scored and four errors were made by Barrington. Six batters took the strikeout route before Heitman. Each pitcher gave up one walk.

Elinor and McCoy socked out doubles for Barrington in the sixth and fourth innings, respectively, while Humbrecht got Bartlett's only two-bagger in the second inning.

The local team will play their first home game on the diamond at Sprunger Park next Sunday. A strong Kenosha team will invade the local park on that day. Kenosha holds a 14 to 2 victory over manager Bill Behringer's men. Game time will be 2:00 p. m.

F. Grubmeier and Kay Top Wrestling Card at Grayslake Friday

With local wrestling followers still discussing the sensational Jim McMillen-King Kong match of last week promoters are preparing another similar for this Friday, July 29, that should be a wild and woolly affair. Rudy Kay, rough and tumbler Chicago bully, will get the test of his remarkable career going against Fred "Legs" Grubmeier, the famous Iowa scissor king who has been crushing them all into submission with his million dollar legs in the feature attraction at Peg's Grayslake arena.

Kay and Grubmeier have both been consistent winners at the Lake county sporting center over the past three years, but each has been accomplishing wins in a far different manner. While Rudy Kay has been fighting all opposition with barroom-brawly tactics, lanky Grubby has chalked up his victories with downright wrestling knowledge and an amazing pair of legs. So it will be a test of real

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wrestling ability against strength and rough stuff Friday. Each is out to get a match with McMillen and the loser will go out of the running.

He is remembered as the only man ever to hold Ruffy to a draw, and one of the few ever to beat Jim McMillen. Fans are promised an eyeliner when this boy peels his robe Friday to do battle with another giant, George Mansor, burly Arabian. Old Pipe Factory Sold to Junk Man by Glib Talker

A junk man is haunting the streets of Arlington Heights this week in hopes that he will locate a smooth talking stranger who sold him the old Hume Pipe Co. plant in the eastern part of that city for \$10. The plant, unoperated for the past several years, was used to construct large sewer tile during the building boom in 1928 and 1929. According to the junk man, the smooth talker approached him with the plan of buying up the old equipment for \$50. Sewer Rental Plan Will Be Used at Crystal Lake

Unless a referendum is called and receives an unfavorable vote, a plan adopted by the city council of Crystal Lake with the passage of a combined sewer-water department ordinance last week will be adopted. The ordinance calls for a set-up to finance the rebuilding of a new sewage disposal plant at an estimated cost of \$12,400. Revenue to retire the bond issue would be accumulated by the use of a sewer rental system paid quarterly. Condemnation proceedings face the city unless steps are taken to improve the plant.

Post Office Site Bids Asked at Des Plaines

The director of procurement, U. S. treasury department, is soliciting proposals for a site for a new post office building in Des Plaines, according to public notices made last week. Calling for bids in Des Plaines indicates that some neighboring communities may be disappointed in their expectations of receiving a new federal building this year. According to reports, it has been the custom not to build more than one federal building in a congressional district during any one year. However, the 250 public buildings planned in the current spending program may establish a departure from this precedent.

Farmer Dragged Under Binder by Runaway Team

John Randa, 60 years old, a farmer residing north of Marengo, was severely injured last week when a team ran away and buried him under a grain binder it was pulling. Randa fell between the binder and a fence and the knives of the binder passed over his body. Taken to the hospital in Belvidere, it was found that he suffered severe lacerations of the legs and body. Unless complications develop, his satisfactory recovery is expected.

National Bank of Palatine Properties Up for Sale

The First National Bank building in Palatine, together with the Palatine Floral Co. and several vacant lots, all of which are the property of the closed bank, will be sold at public auction in the bank building Friday, July 29, at 10 a. m. The receiver's sale is being held in accordance with a plan, it was reported, to complete the business of many closed national banks. The properties here all been appraised and any bids will have to receive approval in Washington, D. C., before the actual sale takes place. The appraised value, according to statements, have been rated as high and the bidding next Friday will be watched with interest.
